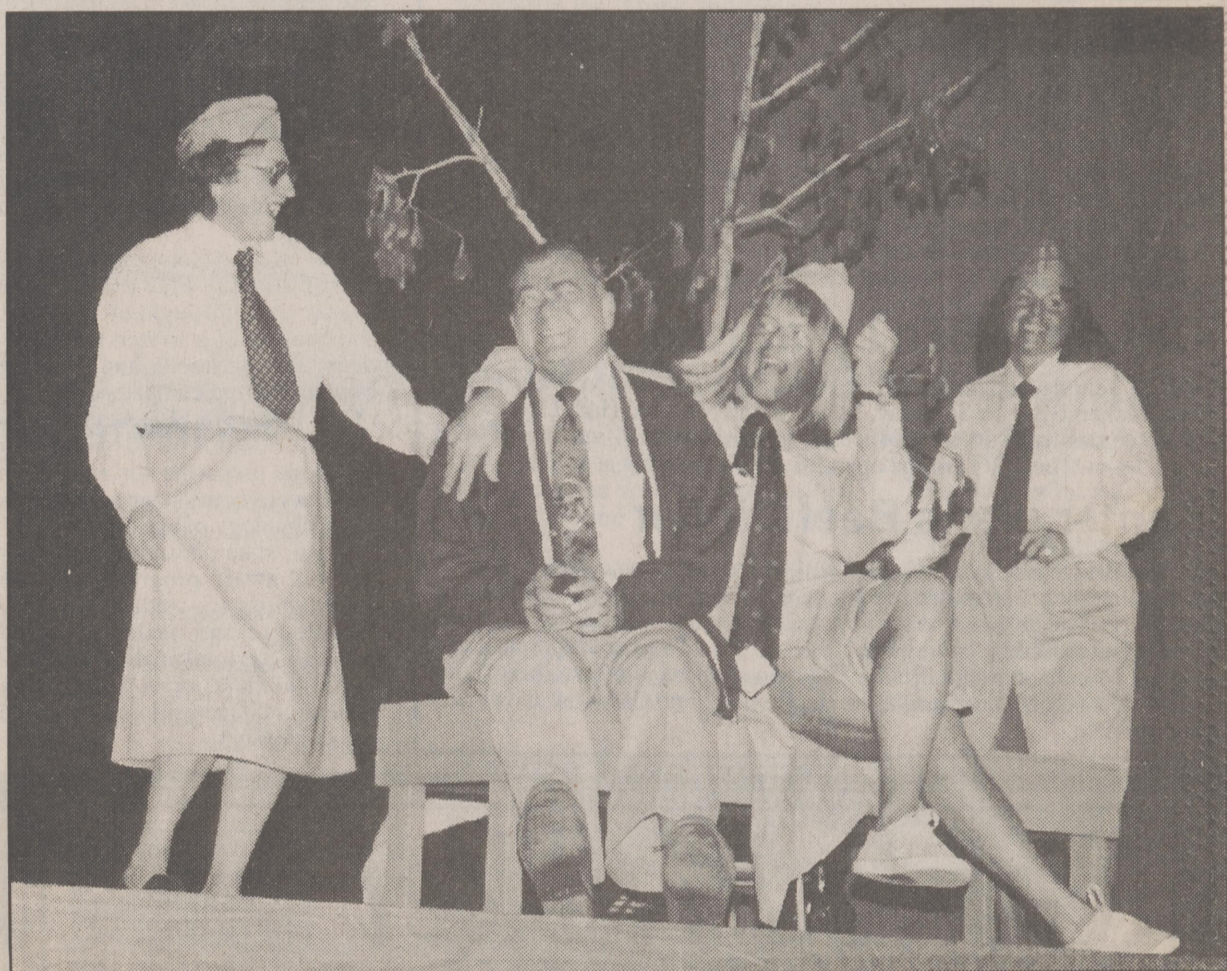

A group of local dancers known as the "Hubtappers" were treated last week to a dance lesson from a member of the Los Angeles Jazz Tap Ensemble. More workshops are planned for the coming weeks.

Gathering at the Central Delaware Dance Academy last Wednesday were five members of the group, Lucy Mondazza, Hilda Jaywork, Evelyn Poggi, Nell Montgomery and Betsy Short. Absent from the lesson was another member of the dance group, Kaye Sapp.

The Hubtappers were treated to a residency workshop by a Lainie Manning, a member of the California-based dance troupe.

According to Ms. Manning, the dancers learned a special choreographed number by the late Honey Coles of the Coles and Atkins team. The tune they danced to was "The A Train."

The Jazz Tap Ensemble is visiting statewide as part of the ninth and final "Dance on Tour" program.

Under the artistic direction of dancer choreographer, Lynn Dally, this unique company has brought tap dance to the concert stage since

Felton Avon Club celebrates 100 years

Two hundred members of the Federation of Women's Clubs gathered on Sunday, April 21, at the Felton Fire Hall to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Avon Club of Felton.

Millie Warrington, Avon Club president, said the group began when 13 women joined to study the

literary works of William Shakespeare, "The Bard of Avon."

Through the years, the club has distinguished itself by serving the community and country.

The club was a founding member of the State Federation of Women's Clubs in 1898. During World War I, members sold Liberty Bonds, donated to the Red Cross and made corsages.

The club was also very active in

the Felton area -- sponsoring the First Felton Alumni Meeting, donating toys, purchasing equipment for the Felton School, installing street signs and historical markers around town and establishing a permanent town post office.

The group is responsible for the new redwood and 24-karat gold "Welcome to Felton" signs.

"We always try to beautify our community," said Edie Hemphill, Kent County Clerk of the Peace and Avon Club member.

The group has provided scholarships to local students since 1924. Norman Burt, a Lake Forest High School senior, received this year's \$1,500 scholarship.

He will be attending James Madison University in the fall. "He was just excellent," said Mrs. Hemphill.

The Avon Club supports numerous charities including the Cancer Fund, Tuberculosis Society, CARE and Meals for Millions.

Polytech FFA places 2nd

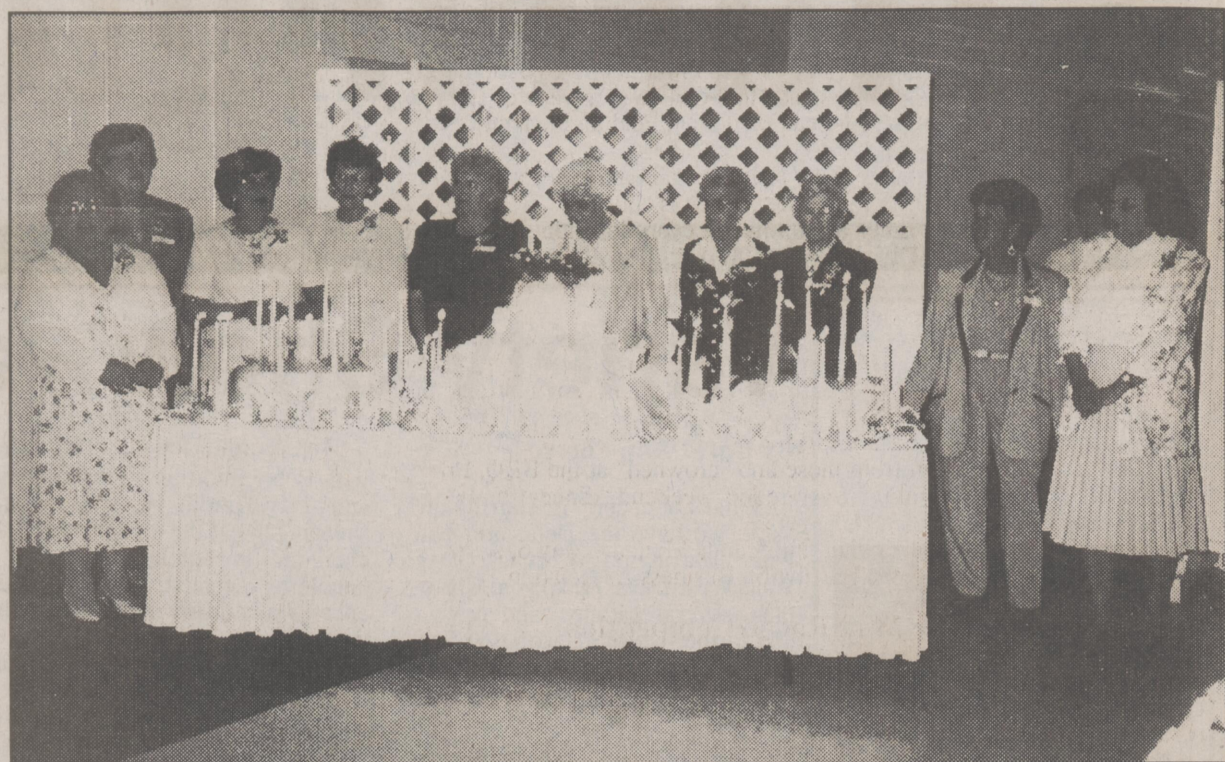
The Polytech FFA chapter recently competed and placed second in the Delaware FFA Tractor Troubleshooting career development event, held at Taylor and Messick in Harrington.

Felton's broom maker featured demonstrator

Among the many demonstrators of Colonial era crafts at this year's Old Dover Days festival is nationally known broom maker Frank Hrupsa. Frank is joined by his nephew, Floyd, who creates hand-made baskets, on the Green beginning at 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 4.

"Ain't nothin' like a handmade broom," says Frank. "It can last 20 years." Hrupsa, now 80, still works as a farmer and shoe repairman. The straw he uses to make the brooms is grown on a 1/4 acre plot next to his work shop near Felton. The craft of broom making was passed down from his father who learned it in his native Czechoslovakia.

"I'm not trying to break any records," he says. Each broom takes about 3/4 of an hour to make. Hrupsa uses his legs and a special device to help keep the broom in place while he is working. "People kid me about the exercise I am getting in my legs and arms."

"Be sure to store them upside down or hang them up. Otherwise, you'll bend the bristles and they won't clean as well." Mr. Hrupsa acknowledges that many of the brooms he sells are used for decorative purposes. Most of his brooms sell for 12 to 15 dollars.

Floyd Hrupsa, 50, is the basket maker of the family. He too will demonstrate an old skill that has been handed down through the generations. "The handmade baskets are much stronger than the ones from the factory. You can stand on them, even the little ones."

The baskets Floyd makes were once used primarily for the garden

to carry fruits and vegetables. "When I found out that most people were using the baskets in the house for decoration, I started making them out of red cedar. The bands are made out of hickory, which is very strong, and we put brass handles on them."

Old Dover Days also showcases the crafts of rubber stamping, spinning, soap making, pottery, quilting, and scherenschnitte. The three day festival is Friday through Sunday, May 3-5.

"Better homes and gardens... and schools"

In very interesting reading, *Better Homes and Gardens* published an article in the March 1996 edition, titled "The Good News About Our Schools".

Author Nick Gallo wrote, "School-bashing is a popular pastime, but Americans are being misled. It's time to set the record straight."

Using examples cited by researchers David Berliner, Bruce Bidle, and Gerald Bracey, Gallo challenges the myths that American public schools are not doing the job. He identifies the myth, provides the facts that destroy the myth, and finally provides some good advice for parents who wish to learn more about their schools.

The myths involve falling test scores and American students' inability to compete internationally in mathematics and science are destroyed. "We're inching forward," says Michael Kirst, professor of education at Stanford University. "More kids are staying in school; more are completing school, and more are taking the difficult classes."

Three additional myths are listed separately. "Just as the nation's public schools haven't plummeted disastrously," Gallo adds, other popular notions about education aren't necessarily true either. MYTH: The American public is disgusted with public schools.

In the 27th annual Gallup education poll, released last September, 20 percent of the people gave high marks to the public schools.

But 65 percent awarded honors grades to schools that their own children attend. Perhaps many people are swayed by the negative media portrayal of schools but react more positively when they get a chance to see schools up close.

MYTH: Employers believe today's students are coming out of school unqualified.

"Some surveys show that employers are more concerned about the work habits and attitudes of applicants than lack of academic skills. They're more worried that new hires aren't punctual, don't work well with others, and don't care enough about the customer."

MYTH: Private schools are superior to public schools.

"Some private schools do have a marked edge, but beware of generalizations. Various studies conducted by the National Assessment of Educational Progress show that, on average, the achievement gap between the two forms of education is surprisingly small."

And the advice for parents. Visit the school. Ask the principal to explain the school's vision. Check to see if teachers have strong educational backgrounds and appropriate qualifications. Check the kind of programs the school offers. Inquire regarding the range of extra-curricular offerings. See if extensive and up-to-date instructional materials are available. Check to see if the school building is clean. Is the school safe? What is the school atmosphere like?

Good advice from *Better Homes and Gardens* for better schools.

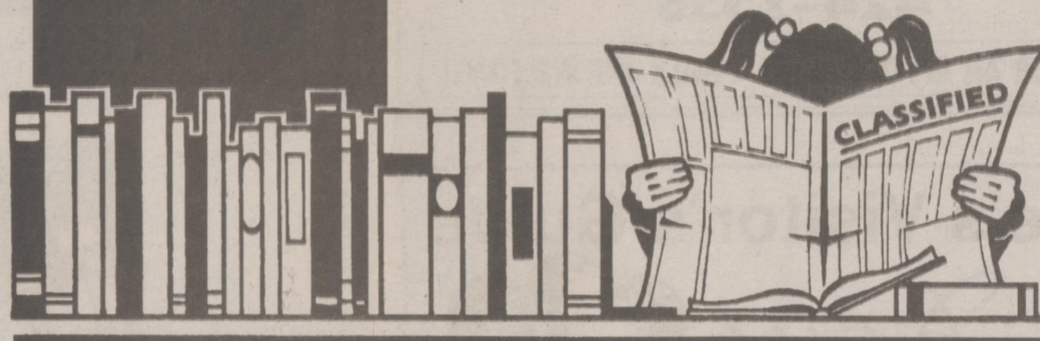

On the Saturday before Armistice Day on November 9, 1918, a lady named Miss Moira Belle Michael read the poem "We Shall Not Sleep" later known as "In Flanders Field". She was so impressed by the last verse -- "To you from failing hands we throw the torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep though poppies grow in Flanders Fields".

Through her efforts the poppy as the national symbol of remembrance was adopted by the newly established American Legion on Sept. 29, 1920. The following year the Auxiliary also adopted the red poppy as their memorial symbol as

well.

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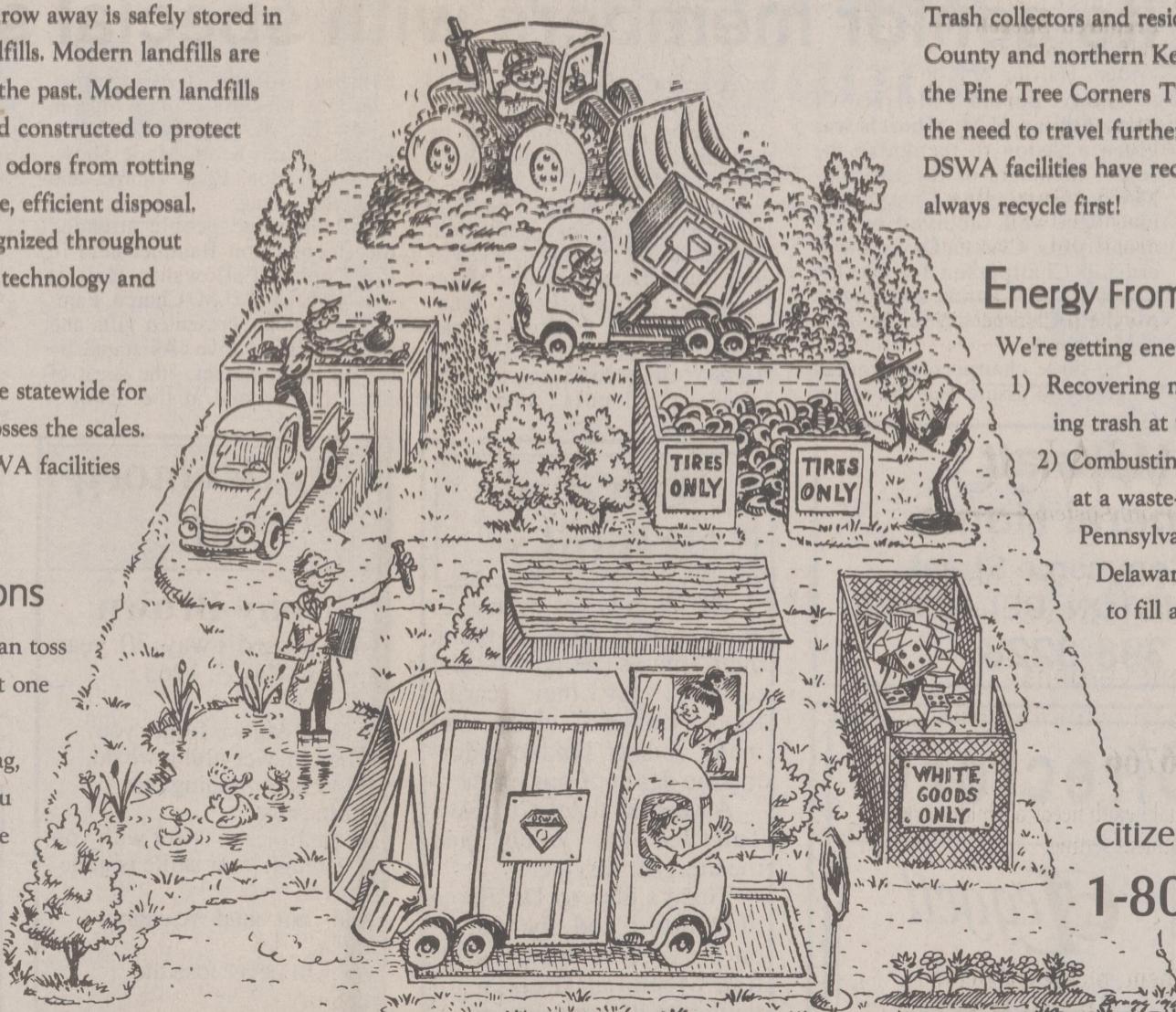

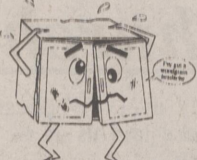

Spreading the Word - A very special couple, Bill and Shirley Conaway

They are both members of the Mt. Carmel Seventh Day Adventist Church in Harrington and very active in the church. Their children are all grown and on their own, but this couple has no time to experience the "empty nest" syn-

drome. They are just as busy, maybe even a little busier than they were before their little ones flew the coop!

William "Bill" Conaway, 54, and his wife, Shirley, 48, both live in Houston now, but it was destiny that brought them together in another little town in Sussex County.

It was in Millsboro that their paths crossed for the first time. Both were from very different backgrounds, and their family life was quite different.

Mrs. Conaway was raised in a staunch Methodist household. "We were always a strong family unit and nothing could divide us or

come between us and our beliefs," said Mrs. Conaway.

The daughter of Linwood and Sarah Taylor, Mrs. Conaway was one of 13 children. "My mother was a stay-at-home mom, and my dad was the chief custodian at the Millsboro School," said Mrs. Conaway.

She said that her nine sisters and three brothers were like stairsteps, and they were all taught the greatest sense of responsibility by their parents. "The main factor in growing up in our household was that you were always responsible for somebody else," she said.

They were taught to be unselfish and to always share. There was a large kitchen table, and all of their meals were eaten around that table. "My mother cooked industrial-sized meals," laughed Mrs. Conaway.

She went on to say that while many of the children helped in the house, she loved the outdoors. "I would do anything to get out of the housework," she said. "Most of the time I helped my dad outdoors."

Mr. Conaway was raised in Harrington on Thorpe St. by his stepmother. "But she wasn't like the mean stepmothers that you read about in fairy tales," laughed Mr. Conaway. "My stepmother was a good mother," he said. Her name is Lula Perry and she lives on Dorman St. in Harrington now.

Mr. Conaway's mother died when he was only two months old, and he and his father were never very close. "She was the only mother and parent I ever knew," he said. He has two stepbrothers, Harold Russ and Samuel Russ, and a step-sister, Mary Henderson. And Mr.

Conaway adds that they are a very close family and keep in touch often.

He recalls growing up next to the barber shop in Harrington owned by Alex Thorpe. He attended Pierre S. DuPont School and graduated from the 8th grade. He then went to William Henry High for two years and eventually moved down to Millsboro with one of his cousins. But he hitchhiked each day to Harrington to finish high school.

Mr. Conaway worked and supported himself while attending school. On Saturdays, he washed cars, worked in the barber shop and in the local dry cleaners.

"We were poor growing up, but we always had enough to eat, always had clean clothes and a clean house. "My mother was spotless and still is," he laughed.

Mrs. Conaway graduated from William C. Jason School in Georgetown and then from Delaware State University where she majored in education. Now working on her master's degree, she has four more classes to go and teaches 6th grade social studies at W.T. Chipman Middle School.

Mr. Conaway works as a maintenance technician at the Delaware State Police Barracks in Bridgeville.

They met when Mr. Conaway was working in Milton. It was there that he got acquainted with his future wife's mother. He would hitch a ride from her each day to go to work and eventually met her daughter.

"I used to see her walking back and forth in front of my cousin's house, and I finally asked her for a date," he smiled.

They dated for about two years before they got married and now have three children, Vernon, 27, Russell, 24, and Andrea, 21.

The church and education are very important to the Conaways. Russell works at W.T. Chipman Middle School, Vernon works as an accountant in Long Island, N.Y., and Andrea will graduate from Lincoln University soon.

They have been Seventh Day Adventists for 13 years now, but Mrs. Conaway recalls when her husband suggested that they leave the Methodist religion. "We were always a strong family unit, and we followed him," she said. "I think it was the right move to make."

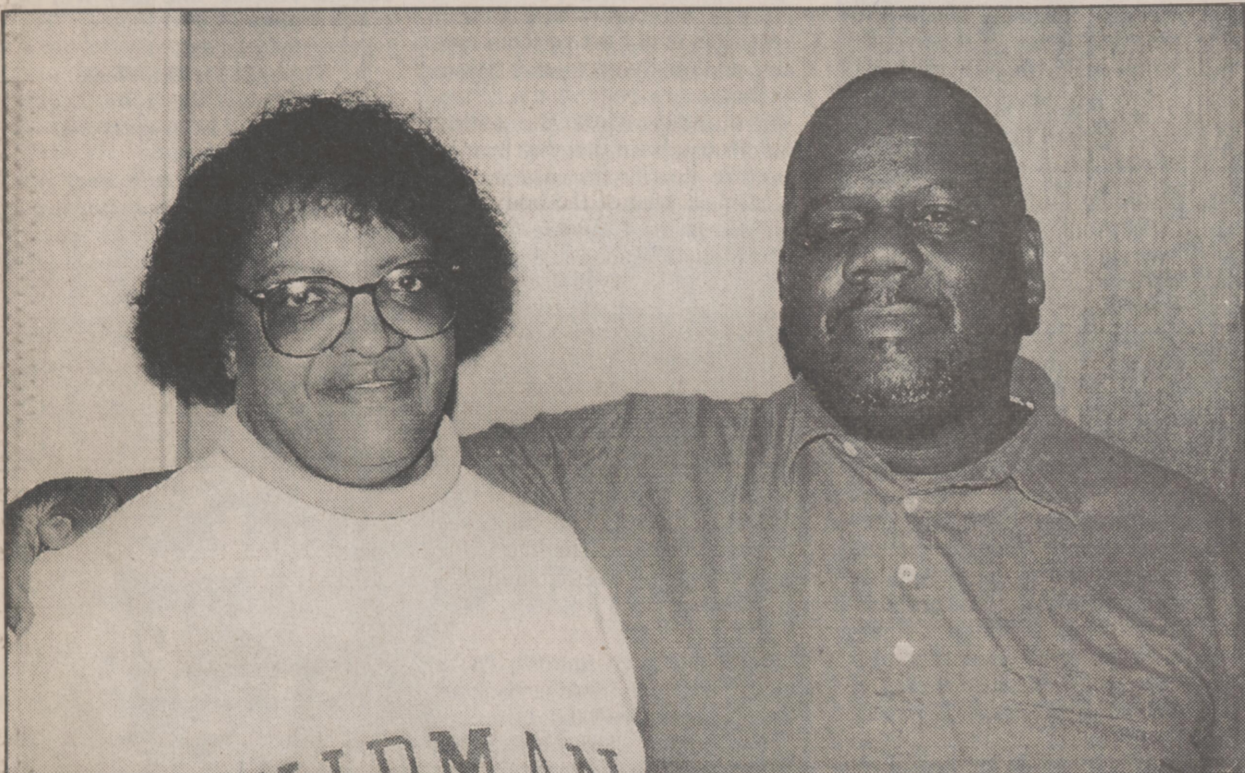
Mr. Conaway sings with a group called the Sermonettes, who all belong to the church. He also works with a church-affiliated association called the Allegheny East Pathfinders. This group is a lot like the Boy Scouts except that it is co-ed. He has worked with them for 10 years and is the area coordinator of the group for about 15 churches.

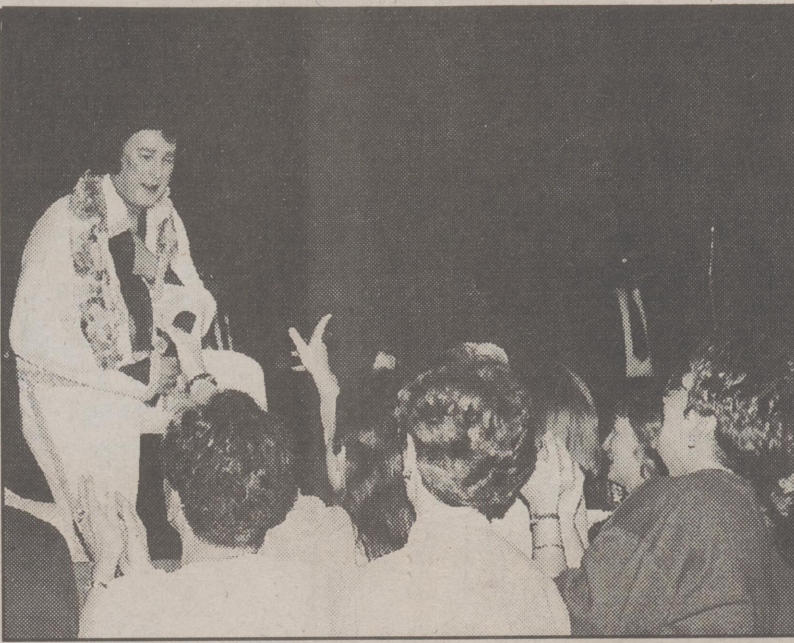
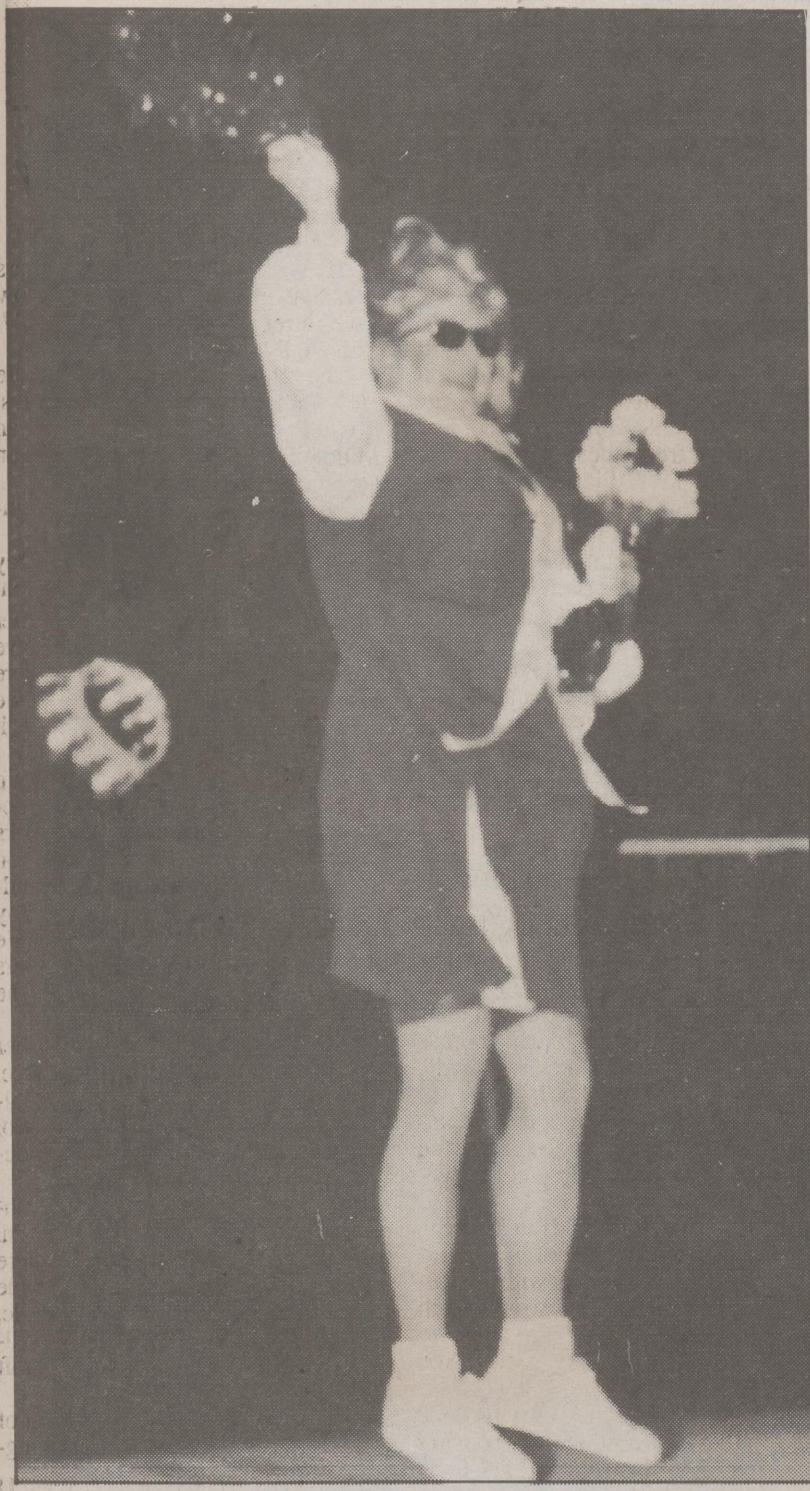

All of the proceeds from this annual event benefit the building fund.



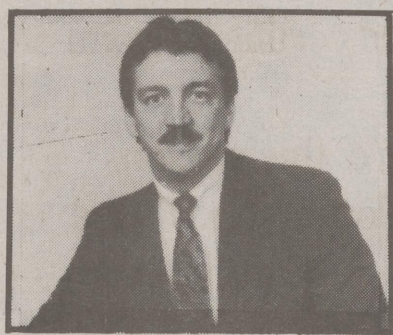

NECK PAIN

The neck is composed of seven small bones called vertebrae. Between the vertebrae are pads of fibrous cartilage called discs which act as shock absorbers. There are ligaments and thirty-two complex muscles which make the neck sturdy yet flexible. It allows eight nerves to exit and conduct impulses which provide movement and sensation to and from the head, shoulders, chest and arms.

Throughout our day, the neck is often overused, abused or put in jeopardy by our actions. Poor posture and stress may be the cause of stiffness and annoying discomfort. Injuries from sports and industrial accidents have catastrophic potential. The paralyzing injury to Detroit Lions offensive tackle Mike Utley exemplifies the possible disaster that can occur.

Motor vehicle accidents are a major source of neck injuries. A "whiplash"

occurs when a car is hit from behind and the passenger's head snaps backward into hyperextension then recoils forward. The victim may feel only slight discomfort initially and develop stiffness and pain during the following few hours. The discomfort may last up to three months but fortunately most people recover from this type of injury and problems rarely recur with proper treatment.

Although we can't always prevent accidents, we can maintain a flexible and strong neck. Daily exercise, good posture and common sense can help to avoid injury and future problems.

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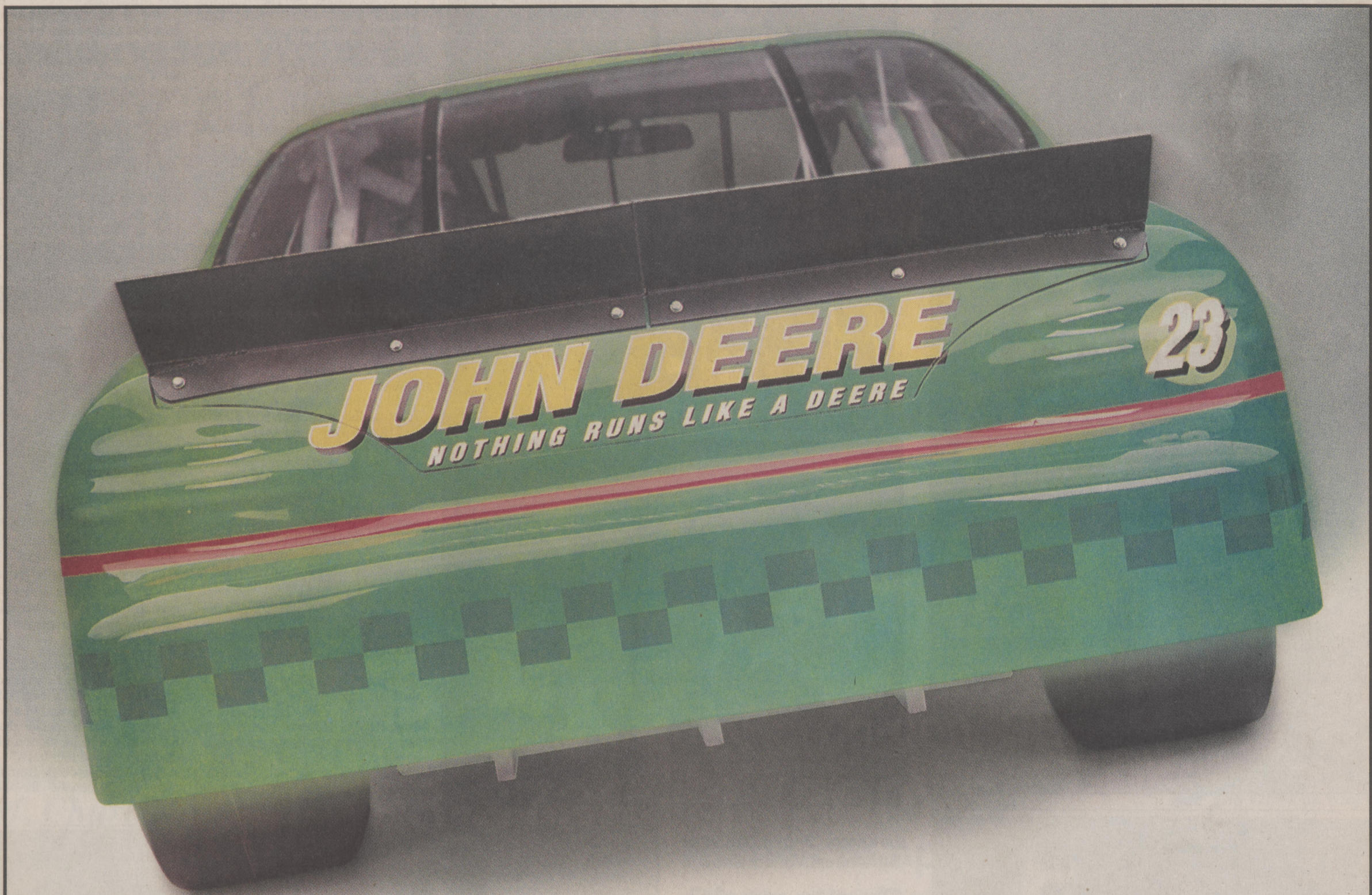
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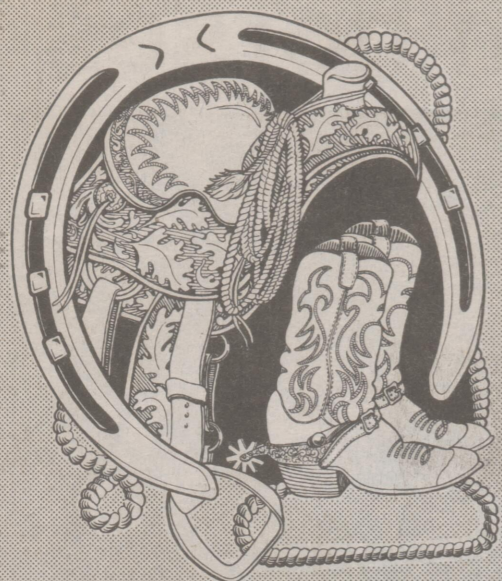

The 1996 Wild West Days celebration to be held in Harrington May 9-12 will be the back drop for a spectacular event - Bullride Mania.

Visitors to this year's Bullride Mania will have a chance to witness a thrilling exhibition of man vs. beast, the nastiest 16-year-old alive, and a national celebrity all rolled into one!

Buffalo Bill

His mother was a black brahma, his father a full blooded buffalo bull - so he was christened "Buffalo Bill."

When tried out as a rodeo bull he was found to be hell on four hooves. For the next six years he was matched with the best bull riders in the world. At this point nobody had ever made an eight second ride on his hurricane deck, but that was to change.

On New Year's Eve, at a jackpot bull riding in Oklahoma, the 1987 World Champion bull rider, the late Lane Frost, drew Buffalo Bill for the final go round. When the dust settled, the noise from the crowd was deafening. They cheered so loudly the judges couldn't hear the whistle for the end of the ride. when the decision came in the great Beefalo had been ridden by the greatest bull rider every, scoring 90 points to win the contest.

Of course, misfortune later befell Mr. Frost when he was killed by a bull in Wyoming. Besides Lane Frost only two other riders have conquered Buffalo Bill.

At Bullride Mania in Harrington, a \$1,000 bounty will be offered to challengers of Buffalo Bill. The would-be jockey must ride for eight seconds to qualify.

The Ballistic Brothers

The "Ballistic Brothers" are a special family of biological brother bulls of the "Simbrah" breed. Which is a cross between the Brahma and Simmental breeds.

Bred on the outskirts of Tulsa, OK, a sort of evil family reunion took place in Harrisburg, PA in April when Dave Martin re-united the brutal three after a one-year separation. Dubbed the "Ballistic" bulls for their reputation launching out of the bucking chute, they are embarking on the notorious Mud & Dust Tour of over 50 Northeastern cities.

One of the characteristics the brothers have in common besides their athletic ability is that they are all polled, lacking horns. This trait makes them different in Dave Martin's herd of bucking bulls, who are known nationwide for their tremendous horn spans.

These bad brothers are known as Iron Man, Hang Man and Demolition Man.

Iron Man, branded #01, was purchased for a record price of \$8,000 with a record of 41 trips,

and was the bounty bull for the '94 season. Just one top rider hung on the eight seconds on Iron Man the entire year of 1994 - Howard Cessna at Winchester, VA.

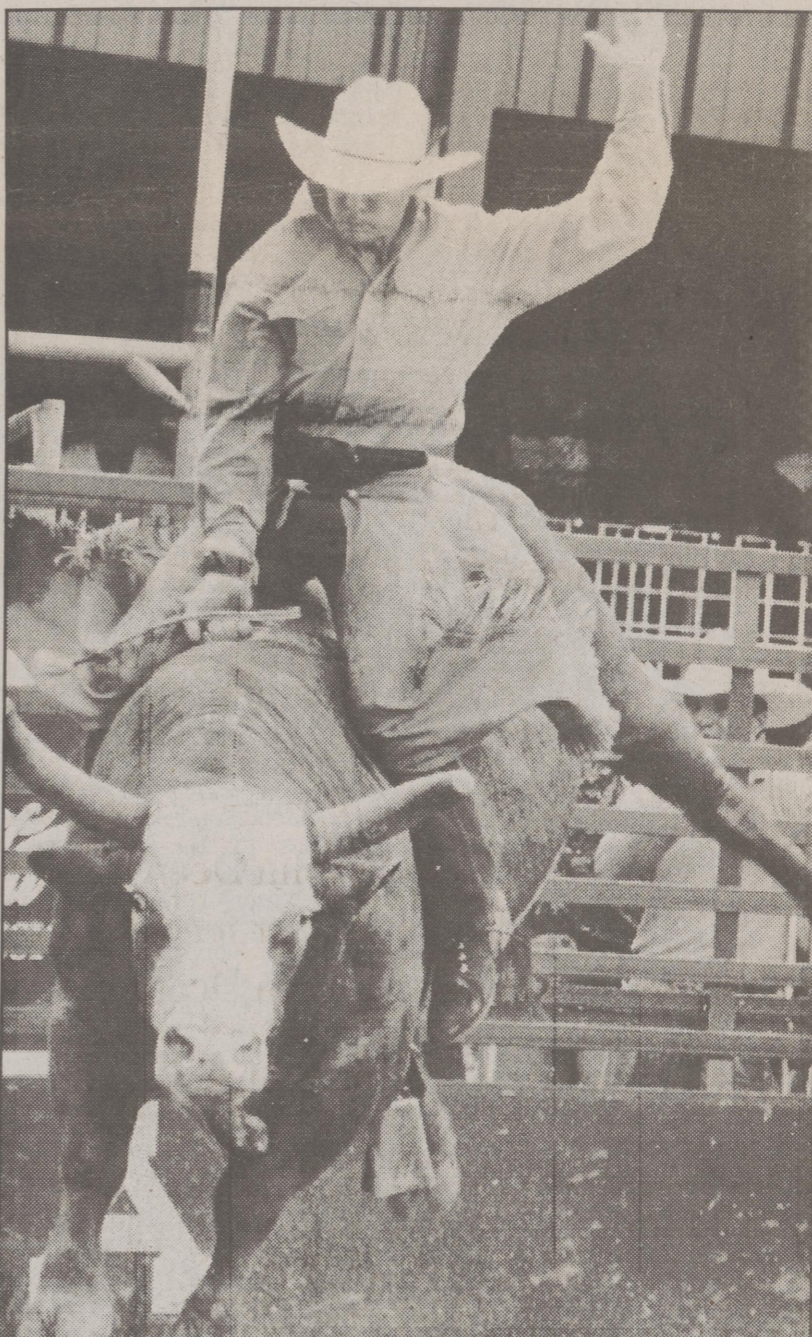
Iron Man went on to be honored as the "worst" in rodeo, with an invitation to the International Finals Rodeo - the Superbowl of this sport. At the finals he was voted the best bull by the top bull riders in the world. He toured with the Longhorn Rodeo in 1995, with a career record of 118 trips and only 4 successful rides - all scored in the 80's.

The Hang Man, Iron Man's half brother, branded #03, was also purchased for four figures and had similar numbers - 50 times out, ridden only four times.

And the third bad brother, Demolition Man, is a full brother and branded #07. Purchased for \$10,000 his record is 49 times out and ridden only once.

Each of the bulls have their own evil them song. Any one of the brothers may be ridden at the Wild West Cays - but with their records, they usually win out over the cowboy. Martin says, "The Ballistic Brothers prove bucking ability is hereditary."

Bullride Mania will be held in front of the grandstand at the Delaware State Fairgrounds on U.S. Route 13 just south of Harrington on Friday and Saturday beginning at 7:30 p.m.



J.R. Raulerson, a professional bull rider from Glen Bernie, Maryland, is one of only three riders to have conquered the great beefalo, "Buffalo Bill". The first cowboy to accomplish this feat was the last Lane Frost, World Champion Bull rider whose life was featured in the movie *Eight Seconds*. are stalls, fresh water, and shade available throughout the entire day.

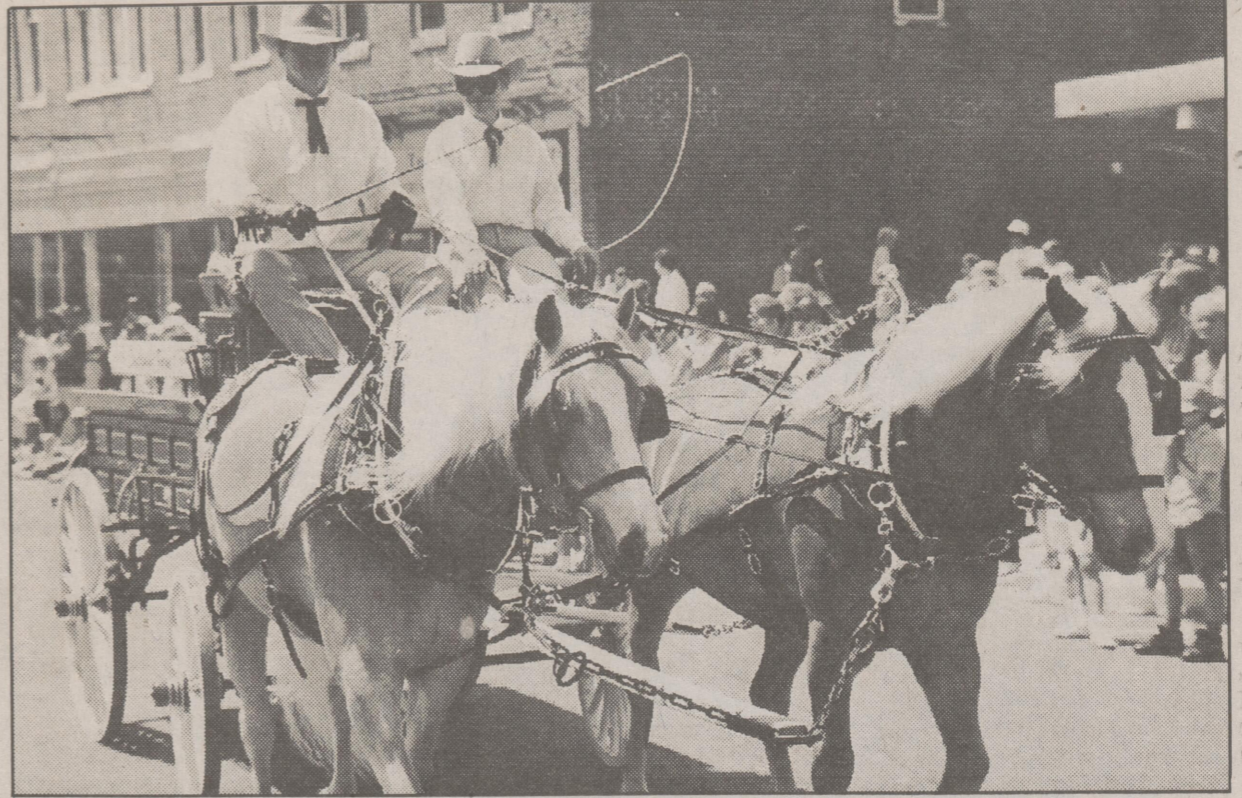

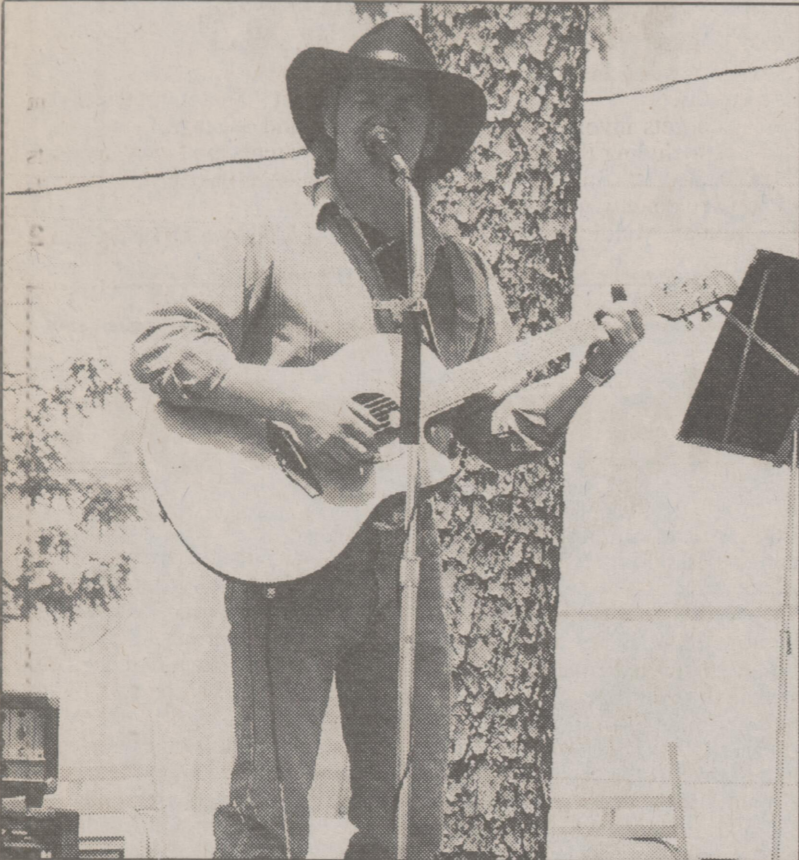
The parade will begin at 11:00 a.m. with line up beginning at 10:30 a.m. at the back entrance of the Delaware State Fairgrounds.

Where else but in Harrington are there such wild and wonderful goings on," said Frank Chick, who along with his wife, Linda, produces Wild West Days.

Harrington's Fifth Annual Wild West Days will be held on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 9, 10, 11 and 12. Four big days of fun, games and excitement for more than 10,000 community members and visitors from the tri-state area.

Everything is in place and ready to begin on Thursday night, May 9, with the Texas Barbecue and Country Dance at the Delaware State Fairgrounds.

The evening is planned to set the tone for the four-day festival and to thank those who helped make Wild West Days possible.

But who is responsible for making Wild West Days possible? How does it fall into place? When it begins, it seems to flow like a river. But if you knew how much work goes into producing these four days of fun and excitement, you wouldn't believe it.

It started five years ago with advertising executives Tonda and Joe Parks of Dover coming up with the idea of a rodeo. What better place to hold a rodeo than at the Delaware State Fairgrounds? What better sponsors than Frank and Linda Chick, owners of Chick's of Harrington, a western apparel and equipment store on Rt. 13, across from the fairgrounds.

The next year, Frank and Linda partnered with Tonda and Joe again and added several aspects to the event. A Miss Rodeo Delaware contest was added, and the Chicks thought, "Why not make an entire weekend out of it."

The next year, the Chicks began to produce Wild West Days themselves. In years past, the Diamond World Championship Rodeo came

to Harrington, but this year, according to Frank, something even more exciting is coming to town.

"Dave Martin's Rodeo from Harrisburg, Pa. will be here, and you ain't seen nothing until you watch this bullriding," said Frank.

He went on to say that bullriding is becoming one of the most popular and dangerous sports around. "The clowns actually entice the bulls to fight to keep them occupied so that the riders can get to safety," he said.

Frank and Linda not only own Chick's of Harrington, but they own a printing business in Harrington, Graphics Unlimited, a sewing factory, a saddle factory in Alabama and Kindred Spirits, a health food store in Dover. They also have a stable of harness horses.

A third generation horseman, Frank grew up around horses. So he's right at home when Wild West Days comes to town.

The Chicks and their staff make all of the local arrangements for the annual event including advertising such as TV commercials, radio advertising, and newspaper ads.

It's the only rodeo in the state, and this year with "Bullride Mania" another form of entertainment will be presented. Frank says these bulls are the meanest, most powerful beasts ever encountered in a rodeo arena. "They create their own brand of madness, and it's not for the faint."

How do these two people manage to produce such a spectacular four days? It's certainly not because they have a lot of time on their hands. Married 14 years now, Frank and Linda have three children at home, Frankie, 13, Katie, 11, and Sammy, 10. Linda has four children from a previous marriage, Jim, 35, Bobby, 31, Becky, 30, and Scott, 27. "And we almost have seven grandchildren," smiled Linda.

Frank started a tack business in

1974 and a mail order business in 1978. The store on Rt. 13 has been in existence since 1980 when they bought property from Jeanette and Austin Turcotte.

The entire family is involved or has been involved in some aspects of the businesses at times. Jim is the store manager at Chick's, Bobby manages the mail order division, and Becky at one time worked in customer service while Scott worked in the warehouse.

Katie, Frankie, and Sammy all help with cleaning, dusting, running errands and also at auctions.

Linda at one time worked for *The Harrington Journal* so when the opportunity arose to start her own printing shop, she was quite excited. "I kind of knew the workings of the print business, and it certainly comes in handy for events such as Wild West Days," she said.

Frank and Linda employ approximately 100 people in their businesses. They feel that Wild West Days helps the local businesses also. "People coming to the event have to purchase their gas somewhere," said Frank. "They need to eat and a place to stay," he added.

But even though the annual rodeo is exciting for the adults, the Chicks feel that the youngsters benefit from the entertainment immensely.

"The kids really look forward to it," said Frank, whose own children are very involved in producing the event.

There's the hay maze, much like a house of mirrors. "Bobby's in charge of that," said Linda. "And the other kids help build it," she added.

They even break up some of the bales of hay and hide toys in them somewhat like playing "needle in the haystack."

This year the youngsters will be able to participate in the Mutton Bustin' competition, a sheep riding

event for kids four to six years old who weigh 50 lbs. or less. The kids try to stay on the sheep for six seconds. The winner gets a trophy belt buckle.

This year there is a four-day carnival being brought to Harrington by Buffalo Amusements. This carnival offers rides for children and adults of all ages, games of chance and food throughout the four-day event.

The Wild West Parade lines up at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, leaving the fairgrounds at 11:30 a.m. and proceeding up the Fairgrounds Road and the Harrington-Farmington Road to Commerce Street. It is expected to arrive in downtown Harrington at high noon.

The festival continues at the fairgrounds. There will be staged wild west shows, a petting zoo, Apache the Trick Horse and the vaulting team of the Pony Express 4-H Club of Queen Anne's County, Md.

I.G. Burton's will have an entertainment tent where youngsters and their families will be treated to the Magic of Charley, the storytelling of Boe Harris and Ragatha Calentine, Native American music and cultural demonstrations by Pony Boy and performances by the Dance Dimensions Ensemble of Milford.

There will be music throughout the day on the Taylor & Messick Stage performed by Elk Creek Junction, Sal B and Diamond State Bluegrass.

Frank may be excited about "Bullride Mania" but Linda is especially excited about the Gathering of the Peoples.

On Sunday, May 12, the Gathering of the Peoples, a mini powwow and multi-cultural celebration, is planned to recognize the rich diversity that makes up the fabric of American Life.

Native American life will be honored along with cultural representations from African, Latino, Caribbean Island, Asian and Eu-

ropean groups.

Everyone gets involved in Wild West Days including the Lake Forest School District. Students in the Lake Forest elementary schools and W.T. Chipman Middle School will

get to meet "Sweet Betsy From Pike" live and on stage.

Mark Bucci and directed by Charlene Campbell, will be presented in district schools during the week that precedes Wild West Days. Through the generosity of PNC Bank, JCPenney National Bank and Chick's, the performance will be at no charge to the school children.

"Sweet Betsy from Pike" takes a satirical look at the old Wild West. As Betsy and her Ike make their covered wagon journey, they are faced with Indians, the Cavalry and a tornado. Three Amigos to appear

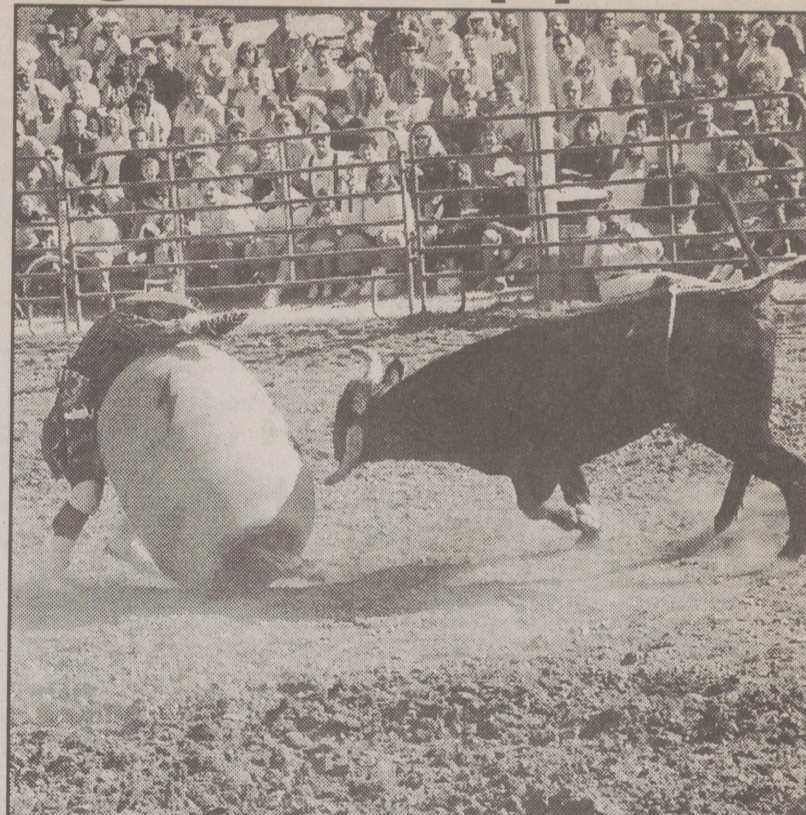
Among "Buffalo Bill's" comrades at Bullride Mania in Harrington will be the "Three Amigos" - genuine Spanish fighting bulls who will test the nerve and skill of the rodeo clowns in special freestyle American Bullfighting competition May 10 and 11 at the Delaware State Fairgrounds in Harrington.

Although the Three Amigos, owned by Dave Martin's Championship Rodeo, were rather small for mature fighting bulls, weighing in at about 900 pounds each when they were brought north, they have grown to over 1300 pounds. These bulls are bred to charge and for fast movement.

Bullfighting Rules
Rules for American Freestyle Bullfighting require the rodeo clown to remain in the arena and work the bull for a minimum of 40 seconds. A maximum of 70 seconds is allowed. At the end of 40 seconds, a warning whistle is sounded. All bullfighters must work the bull for at least 40 seconds unless they are disabled by injury.

At anytime between the 40 second minimum and the 70 second maximum, the bullfighter may signal the end by throwing his hat or handkerchief into the air.

The day begins at 10 a.m. as Odette Wright conducts a religious service with the help of the Nanticoke Dance Troupe. Wright is the curator of the Nanticoke Indian Museum in Millsboro and has been actively involved in the Nanticoke Pow Wow for many years.

The day will continue with singing, dancing, storytelling, drumming, crafts, demonstrations and ethnic foods. Among the savory sensations to be experienced will be Indian tacos and fry bread.

Charlie Mohr, the lead dancer at several eastern regional Native American Pow Wows will perform in full regalia. At the Pow Wow he will do the Sneak Up, a traditional Native American dance. Charlie, who has ties with the Cherokee people, dances as a hobby. His livelihood is performing and staging special effects for stage and theater. He does clowning, mime and magic.

GaWaNi Pony Boy of Jim Thorpe, Pennsylvania will present the music and legends of his people. Recognized as an innovative

educator in the field of Native American history, GaWaNi Pony Boy has spent the past five years visiting schools and organizations to enlighten those who have an interest in the history of our nation. He is an accomplished horseman and teacher who travels with tepee and a horse who is incorporated into his demonstrations.

There will also be inter-tribal dancing, dance demonstrations and an opportunity for the audience to participate. In addition to the Nanticoke, the Lenni Lenape and the Assateague Peoples of the Lower Eastern Shore are expected to take part.

Sal B, featured on the Taylor and Messick Entertainment Stage during Saturday's festivities, returns on Sunday with a variety of musical styles including traditional folk songs.

The musical rhythms of Africa, Cuba and other Caribbean Islands will come to life in a performance by Dennis Minus and a group of itinerant musicians from Dover.

Singing, music and storytelling will continue into the afternoon. Food and crafts will be offered for sale and the carnival will be open all day. Admission to the fairgrounds for the event is free of charge.

Both bull and bullfighter are judged on aggressiveness. Bullfighters are given points for working close to the bull. Extra points are awarded for taking hits or bumps, but not for knockdowns. Running from the bull or climbing onto the fence or chutes results in the loss of points.

Bullfighters can use a barrel, but must work it themselves. No assistants are allowed unless the bullfighter is obviously down and injured.

The appearance of the Three Amigos and the bullfighting competition will be during the Bullride Mania shows at the Wild West Days celebrations in Harrington May 9 through May 12 at the Delaware State Fairgrounds.

Spartan girls near record pace in Philly tests

Jim Blades knew he had superior girls' track talent at LFHS this spring, so he decided to take the girls to the Big Time, for the first time. At Philadelphia's prestigious Penn Relays Carnival on Thursday, the small Felton school apparently was not awed by the surroundings, as the Spartans won a heat of the 4 x 100 relay and another of the 4 x 400 meters relay. Each victory came in clockings close to Spartan school records.

The Spartan record book is studied with the names of Jo Ann Smith, Patti Drew and Carolyn Browne. These names appear at least twice each. In 1983, they added Anita Sherwood and relayed 400 meters in 50.5. In Philadelphia Thursday, Tanitka Smith, Crystal Mack, Christina Jones and Sherise Spence logged a glittering 50.8 in a heat win. 225 small schools from several states vied in this event. Only 17 of these bested the Spartan effort.

The LFHS heat win in the 1600 relay was just as sweet. The locals ran 4.15.7. The school mark of 4.12.9 was another old one set in 1984 by Carolyn Wynder, Pam Pierce, Debbie Jester and Patti Drew. Tanitka Smith opened with a blazing 61 seconds flat 400 meter leg. Crystal Mack had a 64, Chasity Cole a 67, and Sherise Spence brought the Spartans home in 62.2. Here's the shocker! These girls are not quarter milers. They have all starred in other events. Spence and Tanitka Smith both ran around 67 seconds in the eighth grade, but gladly chose to bypass the grueling 400 meters at LFHS.

But the ability was always there. Coach Blades had the girls do a few workouts lately and the girls responded with what may be the 2nd best effort here.

Mack is the closest of the quartet, as to being a true quarter miler, but usually does something else.

The best 1-2 shot team in Delaware, Sequoyah Guinn and Shatanya Smith, each went over 35 feet, then reversed that order in the discus, where they rank high also.

Latarra Smith tripled taking the 100 hurdles with Crystal Mack next, the 300 hurdles with Teresa McTeer third, and the long jump with Crystal James second. Teona Benson, James and Latoya Smith

The boys' meet was more even as Lake prevailed 91-54. Bruce Morris, Roger Alexander, Perry White (tie) held Sussex to a half point. Morris and Dion Gambles were 1-2 in the high jump. Alexander and Morris went 1-2 in the 300 hurdles. Malcolm Hughes (54.1) and Yann Faho got 1st and 3rd in the 400. Hughes, Charley Vincent, Derrick Gerardi and Dan Matta took the opening 3200 relay in a good 8.46. With Ray Scott in Vincent's spot, the quartet annexed the closing 1600 relay. Crystal Mack, 2nd in the 400, then joined Tanitka Smith, Chasity Cole and Portia Leggs in an easy 1600 relay win.

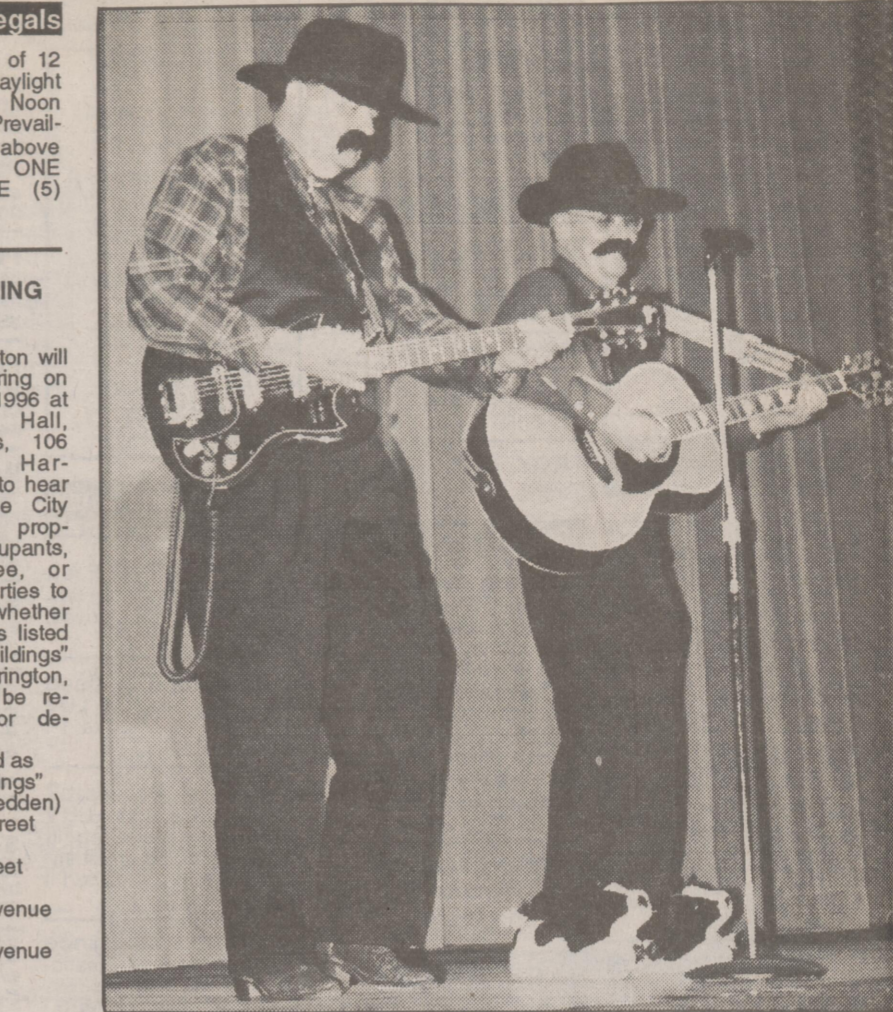
