#### Felton Avon Club celebrates 100 years

Two hundred members of the Federation of Women's Clubs gathered on Sunday, April 21, at the Felton Fire Hall to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Avon Club of Felton.

Millie Warrington, Avon Club president, said the group began when 13 women joined to study the

literary works of William Shakespeare, "The Bard of Avon."

Through the years, the club has distinguished itself by serving the community and country.

The club was a founding member of the State Federation of Women's Clubs in 1898. During World War I, members sold Liberty Bonds, donated to the Red Cross and made corsages.

The club was also very active in

the Felton area -- sponsoring the First Felton Alumni Meeting, donating toys, purchasing equipment for the Felton School, installing street signs and historical markers around town and establishing a permanent town post office.

The group is responsible for the new redwood and 24-karat gold "Welcome to Felton" signs.
"We always try to beautify our

"We always try to beautify our community," said Edie Hemphill, Kent County Clerk of the Peace and Avon Club member.

The group has provided scholarships to local students since 1924. Norman Burt, a Lake Forest High School senior, received this year's \$1,500 scholarship.

He will be attending James Madison University in the fall. "He was just excellent," said Mrs. Hemphill.

Among the many demonstrators of Colonial era crafts at this year's Old Dover Days festival is nationally known broom maker Frank Hrupsa. Frank is joined by his nephew, Floyd, who creates handmade baskets, on the Green beginning at 11 a.m. on Saturday, May

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'Ain't nothin' like a handmade broom," says Frank. "It can last 20 years." Hrupsa, now 80, still works as a farmer and shoe repairman. The straw he uses to make the brooms is grown on a 1/4 acre plot next to his work shop near Felton. the craft of broom making was passed down from his father who learned it in his native Czechoslo-

"I'm not trying to break any records," he says. Each broom takes about 3/4 of an hour to make. Hrupsa uses his legs and a special device to help keep the broom in place while he is working. "People kid me about the exercise I am get-

ting in my legs and arms.' 'Be sure to store them upside down or hang them up. Otherwise, you'll bend the bristles and they won't clean as well." Mr. Hrupsa acknowledges that many of the brooms he sells are used for decorative purposes. Most of his brooms sell for 12 to 15 dollars.

Floyd Hrupsa, 50, is the basket maker of the family. He too will demonstrate an old skill that has been handed down through the generations. "The handmade baskets are much stronger than the ones from the factory. You can stand on them, even the little



#### "Better homes and gardens... and schools"

In very interesting reading, Better Homes and Gardens published an article in the March 1996 edition, titled "the Good News About Our Schools"

Author Nick Gallo wrote, School-bashing is a popular pastime, but Americans are being misled. It's time to set the record

Using examples cited by researchers David Berliner, Bruce Biddle, and Gerald Bracey, Gallo challenges the myths that America's public schools are not doing the job. He identifies the myth, provides the facts that destroy the myth, and finally provides some good advice for parents who wish to learn more about their schools.

The myths involve falling test scores and American students' inability to compete internationally in mathematics and science are destroyed. " 'We're inching forward,' says Michael Kirst, professor of education at Stanford University. 'More kids are staying in school; more are completing school, and more are taking the

Three additional myths are listed separately. "Just as the nation's public schools haven't plummeted disastrously," Gallo adds, other popular notions about education aren't necessarily true either. MYTH: The American public is disgusted with public schools.

"In the 27th annual Gallup education poll, released last September, 20 percent of the people gave high marks to the public schools.

But 65 percent awarded honors grades to schools that their own children attend. Perhaps many people are swayed by the negative media portrayal of schools but react more positively when they get a chance to see schools up

'MYTH: Employers believe today's students are coming out of school unqualified.

"Some surveys show that employers are more concerned about the work habits and attitudes of applicants than lack of academic skills. They're more worried that new hires aren't punctual, don't work well with others, and don't care enough about the customer.

"MYTH: Private schools are superior to public schools.

'Some private schools do have a marked edge, but beware of generalizations. Various studies conducted by the National Assessment of Educational Progress show that, on average, the achievement gap between the two forms of education is surprisingly small.' And the advice for parents. Visit

the school. Ask the principal to explain the school's vision. Check to see if teachers have strong educational backgrounds and appropriate qualifications. Check the kind of programs the school offers. Inquire regarding the range of extra-curricular offerings. See if extensive and up-to-date instructional materials are available. Check to see if the school building is clean. Is the school safe? What is the school atmosphere like?





She said that her nine sisters and three brothers were like stairsteps, and they were all taught the greatest sense of responsibility by their parents. "The main factor in growing up in our household was that you were always responsible for somebody else," she said.

They were taught to be unselfish

and to always share. There was a large kitchen table, and all of their meals were eaten around that table. "My mother cooked industrial-sized meals," laughed Mrs. Con-

She went on to say that while many of the children helped in the house, she loved the outdoors. "I would do anything to get out of the housework," she said. "Most of the time I helped my dad outdoors."




Motor vehicle accidents are a major source of neck injuries. A "whiplash"



### Linda and Frank Chick -

### The backbone of Wild West Days

Where else but in Harrington are there such wild and wonderful goings on," said Frank Chick, who along with his wife, Linda, produces Wild West Days.

Harrington's Fifth Annual Wild West Days will be held on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 9, 10, 11 and 12. Four big days of fun, games and excitement for more than 10,000 community members and visitors from the tristate area.

Everything is in place and ready to begin on Thursday night, May 9, with the Texas Barbecue and Country Dance at the Delaware State Fairgrounds.

The evening is planned to set the tone for the four-day festival and to thank those who helped make Wild West Days possible.

But who is responsible for making Wild West Days possible? How does it fall into place? When it begins, it seems to flow like a river. But if you knew how much work goes into producing these four days of fun and excitment, you wouldn't believe it.

It started five years ago with advertising executives Tonda and Joe Parks of Dover coming up with the idea of a rodeo. What better place to hold a rodeo than at the Delaware State Fairgrounds? What better sponsors than Frank and Linda Chick, owners of Chick's of Harrington, a western apparel and equipment store on Rt. 13, across from the fairgrounds.

The next year, Frank and Linda partnered with Tonda and Joe again and added several aspects to the event. A Miss Rodeo Delaware contest was added, and the Chicks thought, "Why not make an entire weekend out of it.'

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The next year, the Chicks began to produce Wild West Days themselves. In years past, the Diamond World Championship Rodeo came to Harrington, but this year, according to Frank, something even 1974 and a mail order business in 1978. The store on Rt. 13 has been more exciting is coming to town.

'Dave Martin's Rodeo from Harrisburg, Pa. will be here, and you ain't seen nothing until you watch this bullriding," said Frank.

A third generation horseman, Frank grew up around horses. So he's right at home when Wild West Days comes to town.

The Chicks and their staff make all of the local arrangements for the annual event including advertising such as TV commercials, radio advertising, and newspaper ads.

It's the only rodeo in the state, and this year with "Bullride Mania" another form of entertainment will be presented. Frank says these bulls are the meanest, most powerful beasts ever encountered in a rodeo arena. "They create their own brand of madness, and it's not for the

How do these two people manage to produce such a spectacular four days? It's certainly not because they have a lot of time on their hands. Married 14 years now, Frank and Linda have three children at home, Frankie, 13, Katie, 11, and Sammy, 10. Linda has four children from a previous marriage, Jim, 35, Bobby, 31, Becky, 30, and Scott, 27. "And we almost have seven grandchildren," smiled Lin-

Frank started a tack business in Bustin' competition, a sheep riding

in existence since 1980 when they bought property from Jeanette and Austin Turcotte.

The entire family is involved or has been involved in some aspects of the businesses at times. Jim is the store manager at Chick's, Bobby manages the mail order division, and Becky at one time worked in customer service while Scott worked in the warehouse.

Katie, Frankie, and Sammy all help with cleaning, dusting, running errands and also at auctions.

Linda at one time worked for The Harrington Journal so when the opportunity arose to start her own printing shop, she was quite excited. "I kind of knew the workings of the print business, and it certainly comes in handy for events such as Wild West Days," she said.

Frank and Linda employ approximately 100 people in their businesses. They feel that Wild West Days helps the local businesses also. "People coming to the event have to purchase their gas somewhere," said Frank. "They need to eat and a place to stay," he added.

But even though the annual rodeo is exciting for the adults, the Chicks feel that the youngsters benefit from the entertainment im-

"The kids really look forward to it," said Frank, whose own children are very involved in producing the

### Three Amigos to appear


Among "Buffalo Bill's" compadres at Bullride Mania in Harrington will be the "Three Amigos" - genuine Spanish fighting bulls who will test the nerve and skill of the rodeo clowns in special freestyle American Bullfighting competition May 10 and 11 at the Delaware State Fairgrounds in Harrington.

Although the Three Amigos, owned by Dave Martin's Championship Rodeo, were rather small for mature fighting bulls, weighing in at about 900 pounds each when they were brought north, they have grown to over 1300 pounds. These bulls are bred to charge and for fast movement.

**Bullfighting Rules** Rules for American Freestyle Bullfighting require the rodeo clown to remain in the arena and work the bull for a minimum of 40 seconds. A maximum of 70 seconds is allowed. At the end of 40 seconds, a warning whistle is sounded. All bullfighters must work the bull for at least 40 seconds unless they are disabled by

At anytime between the 40 second minimum and the 70 second maximum, the bullfighter may sig-nal the end by throwing his hat or handkerchief into the air



Both bull and bullfighter are judged on aggressiveness. Bullfighters are given points for working close to the bull. Extra points are awarded for taking hits or bumps, but not for knockdowns. Running from the bull or climbing onto the fence or chutes results in the loss of points.

Bullfighters can use a barrel, but must work it themselves. No assistants are allowed unless the bullfighter is obviously down and injured.

In 1983, they added Anita Sherwood and relayed 400 meters in 50.5. In Philadelphia Thursday, Tanitka Smith, Crystal Mack, Christina Jones and Sherise Spence logged a glittering 50.8 in a heat win. 225 small schools from several states vied in this event. Only 17 of these bested the Spar-

The LFHS heat win in the 1600 relay was just as sweet. The locals ran 4.15.7. The school mark of 4.12.9 was another old one set in 1984 by Carolyn Wynder, Pam Pierce, Debbie Jester and Patti Drew. Tanitka Smith opened with a blazing 61 seconds flat 400 meter leg. Crystal Mack had a 64, Chasity Cole a 67, and Sherise Spence brought the Spartans home in 62.2. Here's the shocker! These girls are not quarter milers. They have all starred in other events. Spence and Tanitka Smith both ran around 67 seconds in the eighth grade, but gladly chose to bypass the grueling 400 meters at LFHS.

But the ability was always there. Coach Blades had the girls do a few workouts lately and the girls responded with what may be the 2nd best effort here.

Mack is the closest of the quartet, as to being a true quarter miler, but usually does something else.

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
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
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
