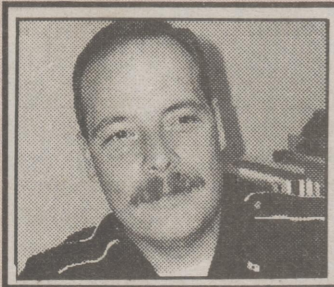

A Mother's Day Story

Mildred Elizabeth Wix Welch is the name of my mother-in-law ... just plain, old-fashioned, but that name covers a lot of territory. She was born in February of 1903 when times were hard and the State of Delaware was almost pioneer ground in some areas.

She had to end her formal education after the 8th grade due to lack of transportation to the town school. She had mastered all the country school had to offer, but she never stopped learning. She never became a member of the Ladies Aide Society or Ladies Liberation Movement, or any of those other organizations which have been the pursuit of many ladies of leisure. She did not have time.

She helped to raise 13 brothers and sisters and care for the family flowerbeds. She helped do the laundry, make homemade soap, and worked with the hog-killings for winter meat. She learned to make sorghum molasses from home-grown sugar cane. She learned to sew and cook, but when all of her chores were done, she could go and play ball with her brothers and sisters, or play parchesi or cards. There were no soap operas on T.V. as it had not even been invented.

When she was 19 years old she married a man she celebrated a 60th anniversary with and started rearing her own family of 10 youngsters. All the things she had learned at home now served her well as she was very poor and needed all the help they could get. They picked strawberries, made holly wreaths, and made berry cups. They grew their own chickens and livestock. And they made it! Love pulled them through hard times. Mildred and her husband became tougher. There was no thought or talk of divorce or going home to mother.

Mildred was a seamstress for her community for more than 60 years, only retiring when she could no longer see to thread the needle. She was recognized for her flower gardens which were the old English garden variety, where flowers of all types and seasons bloom profusely, all mixed together. This makes for year-round color, except in the barren winter months.

The school children learned how to make homemade soap through her demonstrations for them. Many local festivals also spotlighted her soapmaking efforts. Another of her well-known talents was making pies of all kinds. These she donat-

Ducks Unlimited plan Annual Greenwing Outreach Program

Come and enjoy a day full of outdoor fun. Delaware Ducks Unlimited is sponsoring their third annual Greenwing Outreach Program on May 11, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Delaware State Fairgrounds in Harrington.

Youth groups and youngsters up to 17 years of age and their parents or leaders are invited.

There will be Delaware State Police and Department of Natural Resources representatives and Environmental Control exhibits and activities, including: Police K-9 demonstrations, fingerprinting, a helicopter drop in, archery shooting, gun safety, BB gun shooting, trapshooting, environmental education, and waterfowl exhibits.

Other hands-on activities such as wood duck box construction, retriever demonstration and decoy carving are planned as well.

Planned activities are as follows: The DU Message - conservation and environmental protection - wetland preservation projects and video tapes.

Delaware DNREC: Archery safety and participation, BB gun handling/shooting, gun safety/trapshoot participation,

black powder demonstration, waterfowl identification, and aquatic education participation displays.

Delaware State Police: helicopter display, command post, scuba unit display, and fingerprinting.

Dover Police Department: k-9 unit demonstration.

Woodworking for wildlife project: Hands on construction, and placement instructions.

Delaware State Marine Police: Boating safety demonstrations.

The Harrington Fire Company and Rescue team will also be present.

A \$10.00 registration fee for youth will cover: 1 year DU Greenwing membership, Greenwing patch, t-shirt, insurance, materials and lunch/refreshments.

A \$10.00 registration fee for adults (over 17 years) will cover: a t-shirt, insurance, and lunch/refreshments.

Lunch will be provided for all participants.

Poster contest highlights Arbor Day

An area company used the national observation of Arbor Day recently as a chance to reach out to the local community.

Rand-Whitney, a manufacturer of container board packaging, held a poster contest for area youngsters. Charmaine A. Vaughn, human resources supervisor for the company, said the idea was to get the children to "conceptually express their concerns about the environment and ecology."

"We felt this was an excellent way to demonstrate our belief in protecting the environment," Ms. Vaughn said.

She said although the company is involved with other community

outreach efforts, this is the first time they've done anything focusing on Arbor Day. With 169 employees at Rand-Whitney working to produce paper-related products, Ms. Vaughn said the Arbor Day tie-in seemed like a natural.

The entries in the contest were

broken down into four age groups covering kindergarten through 12th grade. The 30 entries were posted in the company's cafeteria and employees selected the winners by casting ballots for each group.

During the ceremony at Our Place youth center in Harrington, top winners were awarded art supplies with the other participants receiving ribbons and certificates. The company also distributed 250 Blue Spruce seedlings from the National Arbor Day Foundation to the contestants, Rand-Whitney employees and the police and fire departments.

Ms. Vaughn said the effort cost next to nothing, yet it proved very rewarding. "Not only to us to give to the community, but also to give them the opportunity to help the environment," she said.

"We anticipate it will be an annual event, and perhaps we will extend it," Ms. Vaughn said. "We'd like to see interested people from the schools come forward and work with us and help sponsor it."

When Mildred was almost middle aged, she went to work at the local sewing factory. She had worked there as a young wife, and now went back to add income because some of the younger children wanted to attend higher education. Through Mildred's efforts, one of these now heads a hospital in Florida, another is part owner in a restaurant supply business. All of her children prospered and all made her proud as they took their places in society.

Mildred Elizabeth Wix Welch today is 93 years young. She still thinks she is 23, however, and her thoughts are still young. Her mind is strong, and I hope she lives to be 123 years old if she stays as healthy as she is.

Being a strong role model for many young women in her com-

munity, many have tried to learn from her, but no one person has mastered all she does and knows. Did they make them of stronger stuff in the early 1900's? Perhaps, but remember that they did not eat preservatives in their meat or vegetables. Food was home-canned or prepared. They also lived a more strenuous daily life which strengthened the body and made it able to endure more.

But perhaps the main reason Mildred has been so strong is her faith in God. She has attended church all her life, and when the hard times come, she turns to God for help. He never lets her down.

Mildred Elizabeth Wix Welch is my mother-in-law, but I have never listened to awful jokes about mothers-in-law. If everyone had her, there would be no such jokes. For she is one hard woman to beat, but one peach of a mother!

Our contractors, Teal Construction and Hopkins Construction are taking all possible steps to restore the areas to what they were before they started. If

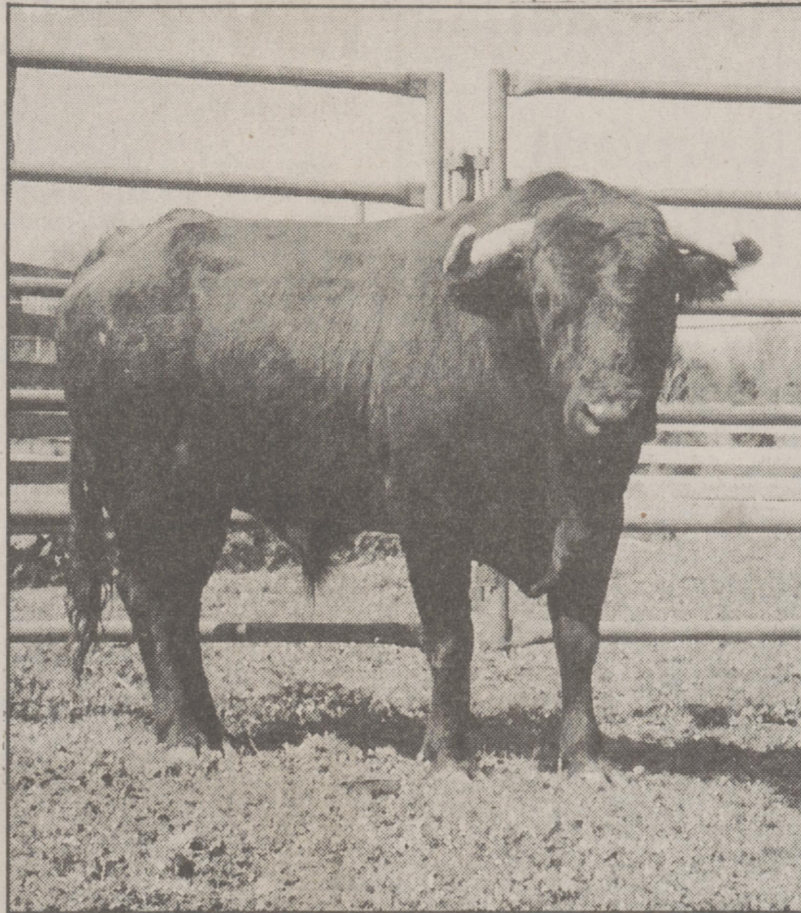
you have any questions about your area when they are working in it, please call me.

My late husband, Carroll Welch Jr., used to tell me about one teacher he idolized. Miss Salley Winfrey was her name. When he was a shy teen-ager, (yes, you read me right) his English class was reading one of the classics, perhaps like *Ivanhoe*.

In the story, it described a young man by the width of his shoulders. The teacher was trying to impress the students of the massive size of those shoulders. To prove her point, Miss Winfrey looked around the room and decided to measure Carroll's shoulders.

They were the exact size of the young man in the story. This made Carroll proud to think he was as big as the hero in the book.

From that day on, Miss Winfrey was his favorite teacher.

I, too, had a favorite teacher. She studied at the University of Delaware, graduated with a degree in Home Economics, and her first teaching position was at Lord Baltimore School.

One year later, she married and moved upstate. She began teaching at Milford School, and after the birth of her second son, she took off some time.

When she returned to teaching, she went to Felton School. However, Milford High School knew her calibre and asked her to return to its employ. It was good that she did, or I might have never met her.

For three years, Mildred Wells, who now lives in Harrington, helped shape my future. She was the one who started me on my career as a seamstress.

Whatever homemaking abilities I have, are through her training. Her strongest influence, however, and the one which has lasted all of these years, came one day as I was turning in a class sewing project.

We always had to put our name on a piece of paper large enough for her to mark our efforts. This was then pinned to the garment. I was in a hurry this particular day, and I simply tore off a corner of a page and scribbled my name on it.

She knew I was at the time planning to become a missionary. She called me back to her desk.

"When you get out in the field, are you just going to tear a slab off of a shingle and hang it up with your name on it?" she asked. I was

embarrassed, but it made me stop and think. From that day forward, it has come to my mind many times as I have been tempted to do sloppy work in some way. I feel that she is still influencing me to do my best.

Mildred Wells has lived in Harrington for quite a long time now, and if you have never gotten acquainted with her, please do. She is a very special lady.

Now the moral of this little story is this: You never know how far-reaching your influence will carry. It can be for good or evil. Only you can decide. Use it wisely.

Mildred Wells was a good teacher 50 years ago, and she still influences me today.

Who are you going to influence in the future?

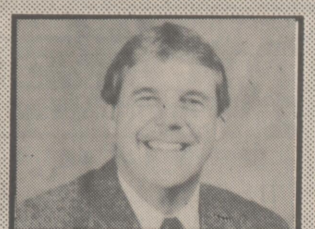

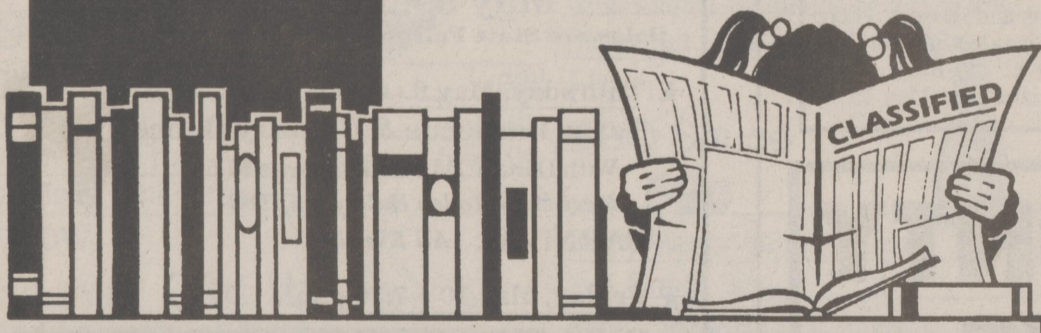

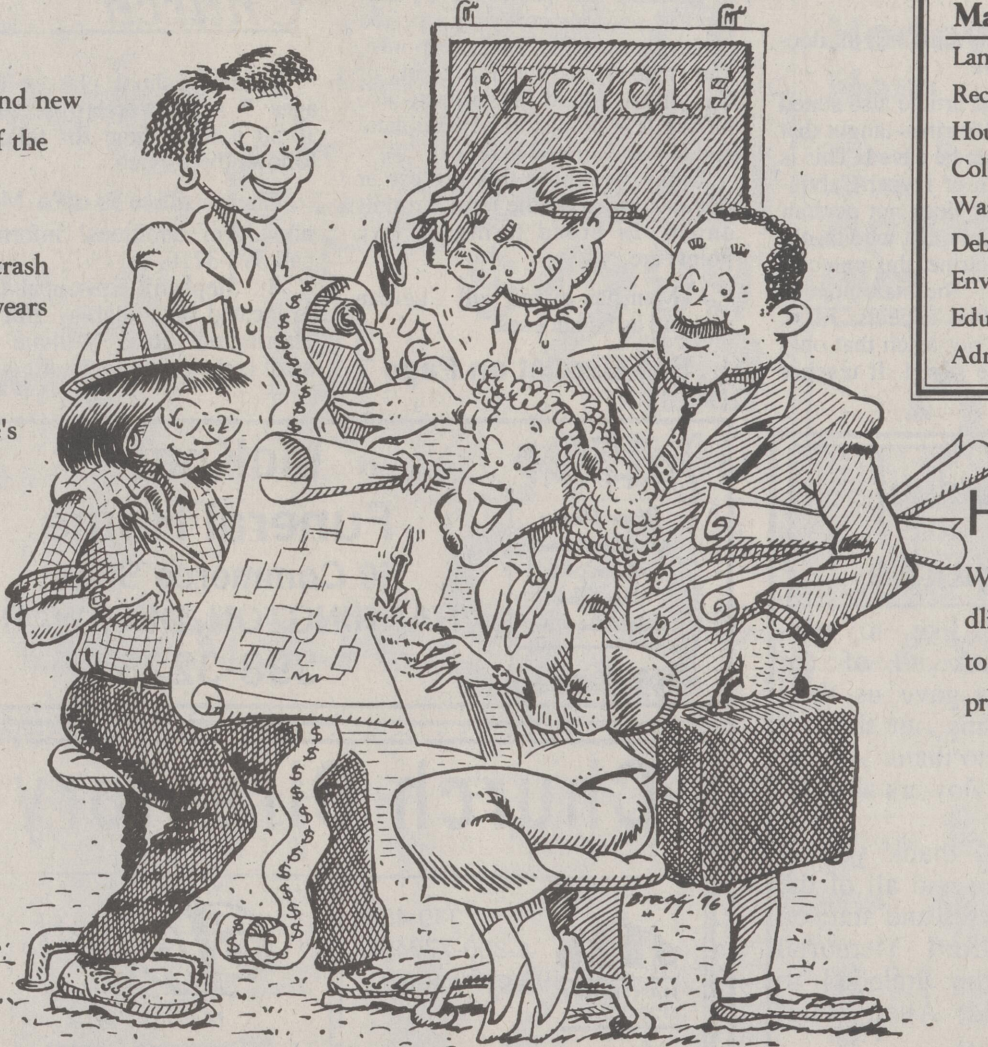

Trinity United Methodist Church - Home of the area's only pipe organ

The organ at Trinity United Methodist Church in Harrington is the only pipe organ in this area, and was installed by the Estey Organ Company in 1924.

According to a report compiled by Mrs. Charlotte Harrington of Harrington for the 100th anniversary of the church in 1980, the senior choir was directed by Mr. Irving Legates with Mrs. Lulu Holmes Potter as organist. Mrs. Bela Sylvester also assisted as organist.

In 1939, Mr. Melvin Brobst became organist and choir director until 1992 when Mrs. Betty Wix took over the duties that continue today.

In 1984, extensive restoration operations were undertaken to update the organ. The work was done by R.G. Lent Organ Company at that time located in Bayville, New Jersey.

The restoration was accomplished during the pastorate of the Rev. Carole Beyer and completed in March of 1984 when a rededication service was held.

Extensive assistance was provided by Mr. David Beyer, husband of Rev. Beyer, who provided extensive advice with his expertise in these matters that was of great help to Mr. Brobst who was the organist at the time.

The restoration came to a cost of \$12,000, a great deal of money in those days, but raised in 76 days that surpassed the goal that was needed. The extra amount went toward other improvements necessary at that time.

Since then, the instrument has been used to inspire the music of the weekly services at the church.

Calvinism - An Introduction Romans 11:36

In the Wednesday, April 24, 1996, issue of *The Harrington Journal*, an article appeared in which these words were written:

"In conclusion of this short Bible study, you have found that you cannot be a Calvinist and say that you believe the Bible."

If the above words are true, then history is filled with the names of men who thought that they believed God's Word but really did not. Men like John Bunyan, Jonathan Edwards, William Carey,

George Whitfield, John Calvin, John Knox and the founding fathers of the Baptist faith in America, just to name a few. All of these men were Calvinists. To check the validity of this, one only has to read the books and other writings of these men.

It was Charles Haddon Spurgeon, known as the prince of preachers, who said: "The old truth that Calvin preached, that Augustine preached, that Paul preached, is the truth I must preach today, or else be false to my conscience and my God. I cannot shape the truth. I know of no such thing as paring off the rough edges of a doctrine. That which thundered through Scotland must thunder through England again."

At another time he said these words: "I love to proclaim those strong old doctrines nicknamed Calvinism, but which are surely and verily the revealed truth of God as it is in Christ Jesus."

Spurgeon, a Baptist preacher, was a five-point Calvinist.

But these men are not the authority. Only the Bible is. Any teaching that cannot be validated by Scripture must not become a part of Church Doctrine. During his second missionary journey, Paul preached in Berea. In response to his preaching it is written:

"...they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so." (Acts 17:11)

Today, we also must test all doctrine by Scripture.

The author of the article also stated that "there are doctrines taught that only the elect can be saved. This is called Calvinism or Hyper-Calvinism." This writer does not personally know any Calvinist who teaches the above doctrine, this one certainly does not. The statement is misleading in two aspects. First, Calvinism does not teach that only the elect can be saved. It teaches

whosoever will may come. But it does teach that only the elect will be saved because only the elect will come.

In the second place, Calvinism and Hyper-Calvinism are not synonymous. They are two separate and very different systems of doctrine and belief. For example, Calvinism teaches that all are responsible to repent and turn to Christ. On the other hand, Hyper-Calvinism teaches that only the elect are under the responsibility to repent and believe.

In order to gain a better understanding of Calvinism, it is helpful if one has a knowledge of church history. At the beginning of the 17th Century the Protestant churches of Europe subscribed to the Reformed Doctrines of the Belgic and Heidelberg Confessions. At this time a Dutch theologian, Jacob Hermann, best known to us by the Latin form of his last name, Arminius, although having been reared in the Reformed tradition, was having serious doubts about the concept of God's sovereign grace. After his death in 1609, his disciples, known as Arminians, expanded his teaching into five main points known as the *Five Points of Arminianism*. They presented to the State of Holland a protest concerning the Reformed Faith. This protest was called a *Remonstrance*.

In 1618 a National Conference of church theologians met in Dort to examine this protest. They met for 154 sessions covering a period of seven months. Their response, known today as the five points of Calvinism, found the protest, also having five points, to be unbiblical and it was declared heretical.

Today we know this protest or *Remonstrance* by the term Arminianism. In broad terms its five points are:

1. Man has a free will - he can respond as he chooses.

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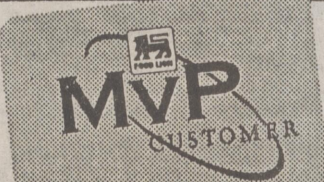

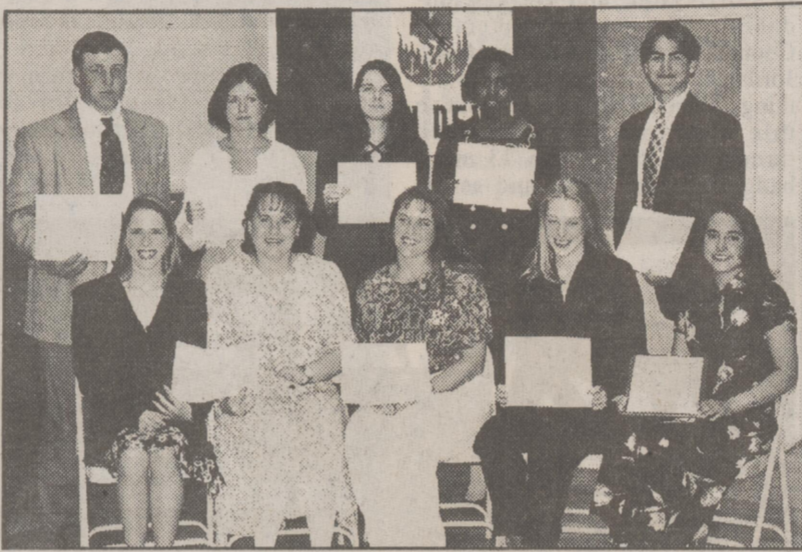

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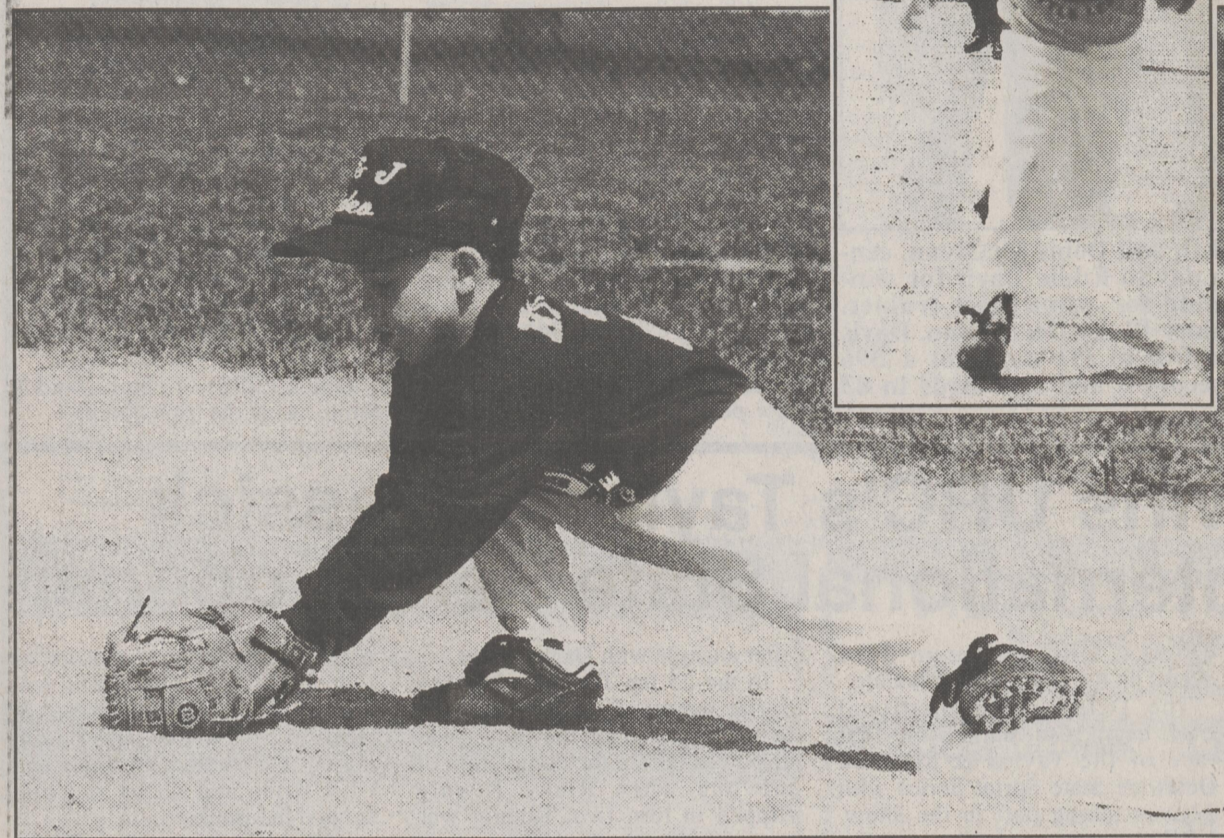

Is Jim Blades' Lake Forest girls' track team having a banner year? The Spartans are unbeaten in dual meets and made a big splash in the Keith S. Burgess Invitational, the Diamond State Relays, the Penn Relays (Philadelphia), and Saturday the local ladies again won the Twilight Relays in Wilmington. They have won this event a few times before.

On Saturday competitors from Delaware, Pennsylvania and New Jersey watched the flying Spartans win six of 15 events, get second in three more, set two school records and almost get another.

Tanitka Smith, Christina Jones, Crystal Mack and Spence shattered the school mark of 1:47.7 set last year by blazing a 1:45.6 and won by 3 seconds. The same foursome ran 50.2 to take the 4 x 100 meter

race and break a 13-year-old mark set by Joann Smith, Anita Sherwood, Patti Drew and Carolyn Browne.

The mark that was approached, the 4 x 400 meters, is 4:12.9 set in 1984 by Carolyn Wynder, Pam Pierce, Debbie Jester and Patti Drew.

Coach Blades had to carefully place his athletes around to win the meet, so he had to hold out Tanitka Smith, who ran a great 400 meters, when the locals won a 1600 relay in the Penn Relays.

Crystal Mack scorched an opening leg of 60.4. Portia Leggs is an improving quarter miler and Chastity Cole is a long distance runner. This duo battled gamely and put Sherise Spence in striking distance. The latter ran another great leg and crossed in 4:14.4.

The seven-year-old gelding scored a 1:52.3 victory last Sunday, the fastest mile ever paced at a Delaware track. It was the fourth time this season that the track record had been lowered. The former record of 1:54.4 set by 1986 Horse of the Year Forrest Skipper stood for a decade.

Other new divisional champions are: Joe Mascara's Trump Casino,

whose previous 1:53.3 victory was the track's fastest, lasting a week, is the fastest gelding in the track's 27-year history and Mitchell and Pearl Fisher's Another Fishy, the fastest female pacer, after a 1:54.2 score two weeks ago.

New trotting standards belong to Dan Camac's Power To Be, who fashioned a 1:58.2 victory, the all-time fastest trot at Dover; owner/trainer/driver Alton Lynch, Jr.'s Kentucky Cheer, became the fastest older trotter last week following a 1:58.3 triumph; Greg Callahan's TV's Holly notched a 1:59 win to become the track's fastest female trotter; Francine Burris and Bert Pulley's Be Happy But Ruff, recorded a 2:00 victory, the fastest clocking for a four-year-

old mare; and Shirley Shand's Power Ranger, who set the mark for a three-year-old colt of 2:00.1.

Eddie Davis clinched the 1995-96 season dash-winning laurels several weeks ago. The Smyrna-based horseman, who recently joined the exclusive 6,000-career-win club enters the final week with 83 wins, almost double that of runner-up Bob Shahan, who has 49. winner's circle 18 times.

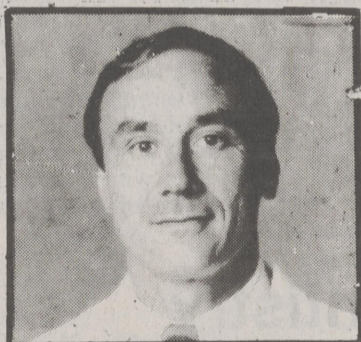

Ocean Downs again

Harness racing in Maryland received a needed breath of life this spring at a press conference at Delmarva Downs. New track president Dennis Dowd announced the re-christening of the track's name to Ocean Downs, its original name from its 1949 inception until 1987.

"That's the name of this track," said an enthusiastic Dowd at the April 4th press conference. "We're going to forget all about that other name (Delmarva Downs) and move forward."

Ocean Downs will race from May 23 to September 1 with 8:05 p.m. post times except for 6:35 Sunday post times. Better lighting, better camera work, and the snappy announcing style of Pete "The Sports Guy" Medhurst was promised by Dowd to a large group of reporters, track officials, Worcester Sheriff Chuck Martin, and Commissioners Trimper and Cowger.

"We enjoyed a 70 percent increase in out-of-state wagering for Rosecroft in 1995," said Dowd, also president of the D.C. sister track. "We want to sell Ocean

Downs' signal to the national audience as well."

By his record of accomplishments, Dennis Dowd could be the man to get the job done. The curly-haired three-generation horseman was imported to Maryland from New Jersey after he rescued Freehold Raceway from decline, and stabilized the half-mile oval in the black.

Imported with Dowd is former New Jersey Racing Commissioner Don Cody, now Chief of Operations of Maryland's two harness tracks. Former Meadowlands state steward, Hugh Gallagher, is now racing director at both Rosecroft and Ocean Downs. Gallagher will be writing the races at Ocean Downs this season, with a \$300,000 Maryland Stakes program available to horsemen.

"We are announcing more than a name change today," said Gallagher beside a promotional table of free teal and purple shirts, the new track colors. "We are restoring the glory days of Ocean Downs, with competitive racing and a comfortable facility. Racing there this season will be as exciting as any half mile track in the country."

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Preventive Dentistry Pediatrics

YOUR HEALTH

As we approach the twenty-first century, current preventive dental therapeutics have advanced to the state whereby it is now possible to totally eliminate the single-most oral disease afflicting patients, namely dental caries (cavities). Total prevention of dental decay has been both a healthy and an exciting goal in dentistry and among no other age group of patients is this more important than it is for children.

Pediatric preventive dentistry is designed to prevent caries (decay) from becoming established on individual permanent teeth when they first erupt into the mouth and preventive treatment involves a triage of basic therapy including **Early Examination** followed by regular checkups and dental prophylaxis (cleanings), **Fluoride** supplementation and tooth **Sealants**.

Following eruption of the 20 primary ('baby') teeth by age 3 in most kids, it is both wise and cost effective for parents to bring their child to the dental office for introduction to the dental office environment to the office staff, to the dental tools and to have the doctor perform a general checkup and perhaps an oral prophylaxis ('cleaning'). By promoting non-emergency, nonthreatening initial dental office experiences at an early age for kids, potential fear and anxiety associated with dental treatment is eliminated as the child ages into adolescence and adulthood.

The second aspect of preventive therapy, endorsed by both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry, includes oral **Fluoride Vitamin** supplementation starting at two weeks post birth until approximately age eight or nine when the enamel (white coating of the crowns of the teeth) of the permanent second molar teeth have formed inside the jawbone prior to their eruption into the mouth.

Fluoride when swallowed and digested, is incorporated directly into the chemical structure of the tooth itself while the enamel is being created through a biological process called **Amelogenesis**. Systemic fluoride supplementation provides the absolute best biochemical and structural defense known for resisting dental decay and this defense is maintained throughout a patient's entire lifetime.

In Milford, the public water supply is fluoridated for this purpose, yet for patients using non-fluoridated well water or who live in nonfluoridated communities, fluoride vitamins can be prescribed by either a dentist or physician.

The third aspect of pediatric preventive dentistry includes placing 'plastic' **Sealants** into the grooves and pits of the biting surfaces of the permanent teeth in order to physically block out bacteria ('germs') which promote dental decay. This treatment is noninvasive, it does not require local anaesthesia ('novacaine') and it should be performed on all permanent molar teeth when they first erupt into a child's mouth at around age six. When the second permanent molars erupt approximately at age 12, these should be 'sealed' as well.

A preventive dental strategy of **Early non-emergency Examination**, followed by regular checkups and prophylaxes, both systemic administration and topical application of **Fluoride** and tooth **Sealants**, in addition to restriction of sugary food intake, provides the most comprehensive pediatric treatment available which will provide the child, and later the adult, maximum protection from dental decay and prevent the need for 'fillings', potential toothaches and tooth loss.
