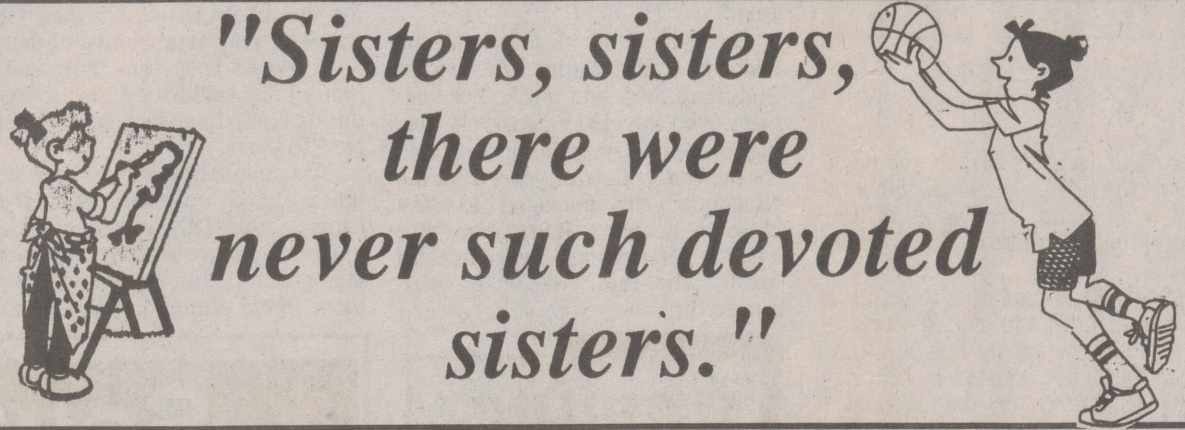

"Sisters, sisters, there were never such devoted sisters."

The Nickerson Sisters, Linda Mills, 41, Wanda Long, 40, and Suzanne Lewis, 39, lost their parents several years ago, but the good memories they left with their daughters will live on forever.

David and Helen Nickerson raised three daughters and two sons. They all lived on a farm in Barclay, Md. before moving to Harrington in 1969.

Although the girls are close now, it was a different story when they were growing up. Suzanne laughs and says that she and Linda probably didn't get along very well.

"She used to tell me I was adopted, and I almost believed it," she said. "And Wanda tried to kill me one night," she added.

It seems that Suzanne had a sinus problem and snored very loudly. "Wanda took all she could take one night," said Suzanne. "And she put a pillow over my face to muffle the noise," she laughed.

"But I got a good night's sleep that one night," laughed Wanda.

Wanda and Suzanne shared a bedroom, and Wanda said that her side of the room was spotless and Suzanne's side looked like a pigpen.

"And Wanda had a dog that hated me," said Suzanne. "I still

have scars where that mutt bit me," she laughed.

Their father did a little farming, carpentry work and was also a horseman. But they all agree that their mother was the main breadwinner. "She worked two or three jobs at a time," said Wanda.

Suzanne recalls when they would go to the Fair as children. "I always wondered why we couldn't have just one more ride," she said. "But now I understand that we just didn't have enough money."

The girls loved their father very much, but their most vivid memory of him was him shouting, "I'm

Asbury and Houston U.M. churches get new minister

The Asbury United Methodist Church in Harrington and Houston's United Methodist Church have a new minister.

Rev. Herman Lipsius has preached at the two churches for the past five Sundays. He and his wife, Sharon, came here from Cecilton, Md. and although it was hard for them to leave many dear friends, they are excited to be in Harrington.

"We were there for five years, and it was difficult," said Mrs. Lipsius. "But we look forward to new experiences and challenges here in Harrington," she said.

Rev. Lipsius said that leaving the two churches in Cecilton was a kind of grieving process. "When you leave a congregation of almost 600 people, it's very difficult," he said. "But it's also exciting to be here in Harrington."

Rev. Lipsius has been in the ministry for more than 15 years. He grew up in Chester, Pa. and moved to Cambridge, Md. when he was 7-years-old. "On the eastern shore, they say you have to be a third generation family before you are a native, but I feel that I'm a native of Cambridge," he laughed. "I know I'm a native Delawarean."

Mrs. Lipsius was born in Baltimore and grew up around the Glen Burnie area. "I'm a Maryland girl," she smiled.

Rev. Lipsius said that much to his father's disappointment, he declined an engineering scholar-

going to kill you girls!"

One day Wanda and Suzanne waxed the wooden stairsteps and floor. "Dad came down the stairs in his stocking feet and flew across the floor, falling into a radiator," laughed Suzanne.

When they lived on the farm in Barclay, they raised heifers and pigs. The boys were older and had enlisted in the military, so the girls were left at home to do the work. Wanda was always on house duty, but Linda and Suzanne's chores were mainly outdoors. The two girls had to fill up the trough with water each night. "And the cows would suck it dry as soon as we filled it," said Suzanne.

She added that Linda would always get her side filled first and would leave Suzanne in the dark. "It was a half mile to the house, and I was scared to death to walk up there alone," said Suzanne.

Suzanne described her sister, Linda, as the smart one. "Wanda was the pretty one, and I was just what they had left over and scraped together," laughed Suzanne. "I was the short, pudgy baby."

Suzanne said that Wanda is probably the best friend she has. "When I tell her something, I know it will never go any further," said Suzanne.

They came from a very close-knit family. They recall that their aunt and uncle wanted to take them to the zoo when they were tots. They permed all three of the girls' hair and put dresses on them.

"We probably scared the animals with that newly-permed hair," laughed Suzanne.

They remember one Christmas in Barclay when it snowed so deep that the cows could walk over the fence on the mounds of snow.

There was no bathroom, just an outhouse near the back door. It snowed so deep that they dug a tunnel to the outhouse. "Can you imagine how cold it was crawling

through that tunnel at night to use the outhouse," said Suzanne.

She added that when they woke up in the morning, they would have snow on their heads from where it would blow in around the poorly insulated windows.

But they also remember the good times in the snow. Their father would hook a sled to the tractor and take them all to their grandmother's house. "That was the greatest thing in the world," said Wanda.

They said there were always big gatherings at Christmastime at their grandparents. The adults ate in the dining room, and a little table would be set in the kitchen for the kids.

On Sunday night, they all recall watching Bonanza and, of course, professional wrestling. "Our dad would get us girls in wrestlings holds, and we'd laugh so hard it hurt," said Suzanne.

While Suzanne and Linda were filling the trough each night, Wanda was peeling potatoes and watching the Dick Clark Show. "Daddy had to have fried potatoes every night," said Wanda. "And I got so tired of peeling potatoes."

Linda recalled a time when Suzanne caused her to get a spanking from her dad. "I was eight, and she was five," said Linda. "I saved bubblegum wrappers and sent away for a little plastic western belt," she said. "It finally arrived in the mail, and I was so proud of it. Suzanne started whining and crying for the belt, but I wouldn't give it to her. Dad made me take it off, and he whipped me with it and then gave it to Suzanne. I never forgave her for that," said Linda. "I bring it up every chance I get."

But other than a few episodes when they were growing up, Linda describes Suzanne as a wonderful sister. "She's very outgoing and will do anything in the world for

you. She's a good person and has a heart of gold," said Linda. "Now on the other hand, she wouldn't hesitate to tell you like it is in a heart-beat."

She said Wanda used to be meek and mild until she started working in a shop owned by Linda, Occasionally Yours, located in Harrington. (Suzanne is the manager) "Now she's quite mouthy. She's a good person and has tons of patience."

The sisters said they were very poor when they lived in Barclay, but they didn't realize it until they moved to Harrington. "It was quite a culture shock when we made that move," said Suzanne.

It was the first time they had a bathroom, but the first night they moved in there was no hot water. "We all took a cold bath, but we didn't care," said Suzanne. "We were so excited to have a bathtub."

Christmases were always special at the Nickerson home. There wasn't much to go around, but sometimes they would get doll babies for Christmas. "Every time we got a doll baby, Suzanne would cut the hair off," said Wanda. "One year I got a doll baby with molded hair. Thank God for that, or it would have been bald too," said Wanda.

How close were they growing up? One Christmas Linda really wanted a Swinger camera. "It cost \$19.95, and I knew there wasn't enough money to buy it," said Linda. But her brothers and sisters all got together and pooled their money, even the \$2.00 that their grandparents gave each one of them for Christmas.

"They collected enough to get that Swinger camera for me," said Linda. "What kind of family would sacrifice their Christmas for someone else's?" she asked. Then she answered her question. "Only a family like mine!"

ship when he was called to the ministry. "Needless to say, dad was not pleased," he smiled.

He attended Dakota Wesleyan University and went to seminary at Iliff School of Theology in Denver, Colorado.

Rev. Lipsius' first assignment was as campus minister for a year at, of all places, an engineering school in Golden, Colorado. He then went to San Antonio, Texas where he did campus ministry for another year.

Then it was back to the eastern shore where he has been for the past 13 years. "I couldn't give up the bay," he said. "And also my family brought me back to the area."

His wife studied music at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, Md. and unlike her husband, who traveled extensively during his ministry training and also for the first couple of years after his education, she managed to stay close to home in Baltimore. "But since I got married, I've made up for it," she said. "We've traveled quite a bit."

Mrs. Lipsius has always helped her husband with his ministry through being involved in the United Methodist Women's group, singing in the choir and directing youth in handbell choirs. She is also director of this year's Annual Vacation Bible School whose theme is "Promise Builders for Jesus."

She has a degree in Music Education and teaches at Centreville Elementary School in Queen Anne's County. She will commute back and forth to work each day when school begins.

"This has been very helpful in getting to know the people in the church," he said. "The people seem to be very open to growing and doing what needs to be done here," he said. "And they are all good workers."

Rev. Lipsius said that he and his wife are very excited about the Harrington and Houston churches. "And there's lots of excitement among the people in the church," he said.

"The congregation has already been very accepting and very gracious," he said. "And they're even putting up with my sense of humor."

There's a youth talent show and a Christian talent show, but nothing that utilizes senior talent on either of the two senior days. I attended a senior talent benefit show at St. Ann's Church in Wilmington that lasted three hours, and almost every act was great. The Rehoboth bandstand has two September shows featuring plenty of excellent senior singers and musicians from Newark, Dover, Milford, Lewes and Rehoboth. If the previous Delaware State Fair senior show had been scheduled for a couple more years, I guarantee that by now the show would be a well established staple of one of the Fair's two senior citizen days.

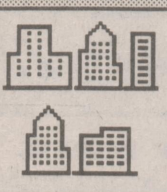

from the Harrington Business Community

This is the third in a series of articles exploring family-friendly work policies. This week the emphasis will be on career trajectories. What are the effects of family factors on careers, particularly women's careers, over time? This research was conducted by Heather E. Quick and Phyllis Moen, Ph.D., of Cornell University. The paper was presented in July at the first annual BPW/USA academic symposium, "The Duality of Work and Family Roles".

Quick and Moen list first the conflicts and career consequences of work/family issues. Among these are career interruptions, low mobility, "the second shift" (housework), the "mommy track", and men's careers as a family priority.

A number of differences are directly related to gender. Men are much more likely than women to remain in the labor force throughout their work lives. Men spend 99.1% of their adult lives working, while women average 82.2%. Women with more family responsibilities have less continuous careers, while those who never marry work an average of 97.68% of their adult lives. Similarly, women with children have more interrupted careers; and those with 3 or more children worked an average of only 77.8% of their adult lives.

On the other hand, research shows that men's lives are affected very little by family contingencies. Whether men are married or remain unmarried has no bearing on career trajectories. Nor does having children affect the continuity of men's workforce.

An interesting sidebar to this research is men's and women's perception of the division of household chores. 7% of men surveyed say, "I do more", to women's 77%. "My spouse does more" report 82% of men and 5% of women surveyed. Furthermore, researchers conclude the greater the responsibility for housework, the less orderly the individual's career.

Time is a resource as is money. Employers can use this information to build a better workforce through sensitivity to family responsibilities and a conscious effort to see workers from a more holistic viewpoint. To do otherwise, is to miss out on the talent and energy of half the workforce.

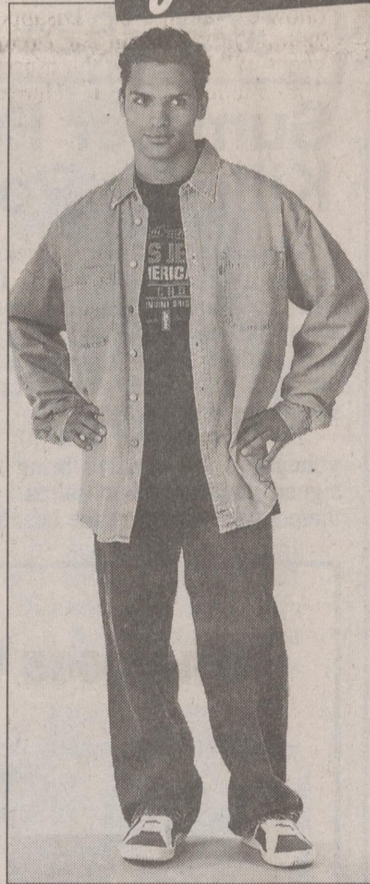

The gift of a hermit crab

After the unfortunate accident which consumed my family during the middle of July, our five-year-old son, Clint, was confined to a full sized cast on his right leg. This severely restricted his activity, not a comfortable situation for a child his age.

Attempting to stimulate his environment in other ways, his brothers and sister presented him with a hermit crab.

Hermit crabs are interesting creatures, confined to the limitations of their environment, often a six-inch by twelve-inch plastic container, equipped with sponge for drinking, shell, on which the food is placed, and either small stones or sand to create the impression of its natural environment (if, indeed, hermit crabs care about impressions!). Hermit crabs, by their very nature, must find a new home as they grow. That home is usually a shell into which they back.

Watching this listless animal not do what it doesn't do one afternoon, I pondered the value of this gift. If the world was absent hermit crabs, what would be the consequences?

Upon reflection, I discovered that it is what hermit crabs need,

rather than what they give, which gives them import.

They need someone to care for them; to be dedicated and committed to their existence. They need their environment clean and stimulating. They need dependability from those under whose charge they find themselves.

Alas, the value in the gift of a hermit crab comes from two fronts. First, if Clint, through his experience with this beast, can learn better to care, to be dedicated and committed to something, to someone else, to keep its environment clean and stimulating, and to be dependable in this regard, what a valuable lesson in life he would have learned.

On a more global sense, hermit crabs' needs are a lot like those of people. If we demonstrate these behaviors toward our fellow man, like we would for a hermit crab, wouldn't the world be a better place to live?

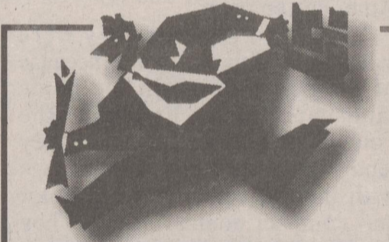

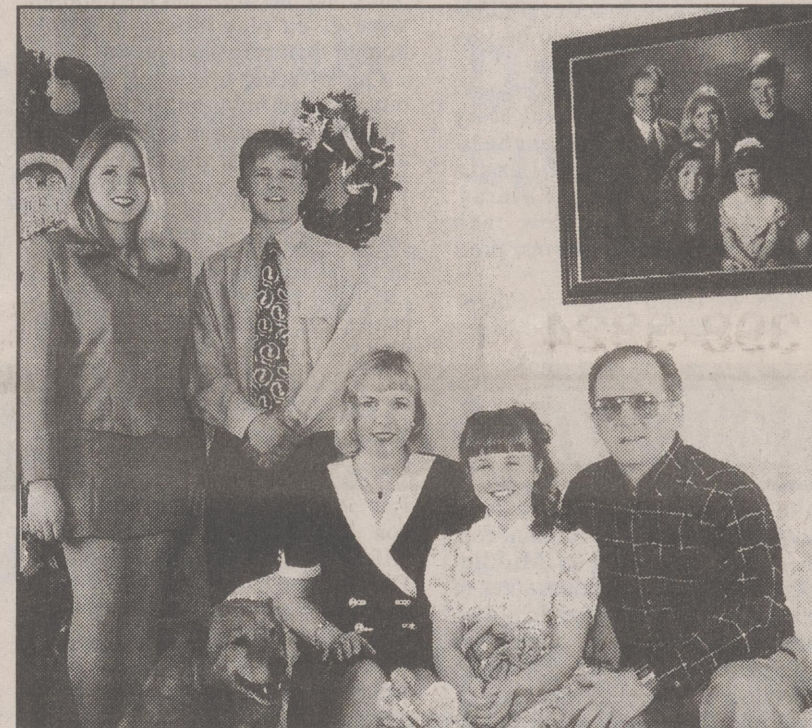

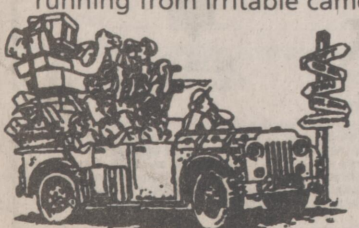

On Sunday, August 3, we welcomed back home and to the pulpit Pastor Simpson and his family. Pastor Simpson concluded his messages from I Corinthians two weeks ago and began a study of sermons from Galatians 5:22-26. He spoke to us about the first Fruit of the Spirit, Love.

This text of scripture is speaking to Christians only. Only until we repent of our sins before Christ, and believe in Him and what He has done--then we can experience the fruits of the Spirit. Galatians 5:22 says, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith."

Pastor Simpson reminded us as we study the text of the Fruits of the Spirit, that if we find ourselves

falling short in certain areas, we should not beat ourselves up with guilt, but take this before the Lord and ask Him to produce in us these characteristics of His Son. Just as God is in control of nature today--the growth of trees, flowers, crops, rainfall--so He is also in control of our growth in Him, if we submit ourselves to Him.

So often as Christians we decide, I need to act a certain way--maybe more loving or more kind--and we try to change ourselves, but until we go before the Lord and ask Him to change us, the changes we try to make ourselves are temporary. Romans 8:4 says, "That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit." When we walk not in the flesh--by our

own strength, but after the Spirit--by submitting ourselves to Christ. When we submit to Christ, our love is not in vain, but brings honor and pleases the Lord.

Pastor Simpson challenged each of us to go before the Lord and pray, "Lord, I want to be more like your Son. Whatever it takes for You to produce these characteristics in me."

As Christians, our lifestyle (the things we do and say each day) reflect who we serve. The scriptures say, "If you love me, keep my commands." (John 14:15) We are commanded to be ambassadors to those around us--our neighbors, friends, family. We are to proclaim the message of Christ and His love. We may have to endure personal rejection from others because of

our stand for Christ--but that is putting others before ourselves. Isn't it worth the chance of that personal rejection to know that someday that person we reached out to in love may not spend an eternity in hell, but with us in heaven with Christ?
