education.



"She used to tell me I was adopted, and I almost believed it," she said. "And Wanda tried to kill me one night," she added.

It seems that Suzanne had a sinus problem and snored very loudly. "Wanda took all she could take one night," said Suzanne. "And she put a pillow over my face to muffle the noise," she laughed.

"But I got a good night's sleep that one night," laughed Wanda. Wanda and Suzanne shared a bedroom, and Wanda said that her side of the room was spotless and Suzanne's side looked like a pig-

pen.
"And Wanda had a dog that hated me," said Suzanne. "I still


have scars where that mutt bit me," she laughed.

Their father did a little farming, carpentry work and was also a horseman. But they all agree that their mother was the main breadwinner. "She worked two or three jobs at a time," said Wanda.

The girls loved their father very much, but their most vivid memory of him was him shouting, "I'm

"We were there for five years, and it was difficult," said Mrs. Lipsius. "But we look forward to new experiences and challenges here in Harrington," she said.





going to kill you girls!" One day Wanda and Suzanne waxed the wooden stairsteps and floor. "Dad came down the stairs in his stocking feet and flew across

the floor, falling into a radiator," laughed Suzanne.

When they lived on the farm in Barclay, they raised heifers and pigs. The boys were older and had enlisted in the military, so the girls were left at home to do the work. Wanda was always on house duty, but Linda and Suzanne's chores were mainly outdoors. The two girls had to fill up the trough with water each night. "And the cows would suck it dry as soon as we filled it," said Suzanne.

She added that Linda would always get her side filled first and would leave Suzanne in the dark. "It was a half mile to the house, and was scared to death to walk up there alone," said Suzanne.

Suzanne described her sister, Linda, as the smart one. "Wanda was the pretty one, and I was just what they had left over and scraped together," laughed Suzanne. "I was the short, pudgy baby."

Suzanne said that Wanda is probably the best friend she has. "When I tell her something, I know it will never go any further," said

They came from a very closeknit family. They recall that their aunt and uncle wanted to take them to the zoo when they were tots. They permed all three of the girls' hair and put dresses on them.

"We probably scared the animals with that newly-permed hair," laughed Suzanne.

They remember one Christmas in Barclay when it snowed so deep that the cows could walk over the fence on the mounds of snow.

There was no bathroom, just an outhouse near the back door. It snowed so deep that they dug a tunnel to the outhouse. "Can you imagine how cold it was crawling

through that tunnel at night to use the outhouse," said Suzanne.

She added that when they woke up in the morning, they would have snow on their heads from where it would blow in around the poorly insulated windows.

But they also remember the good times in the snow. Their father would hook a sled to the tractor and take them all to their grandmother's house. "That was the greatest thing in the world," said Wanda.

They said there were always big gatherings at Christmastime at their grandparents. The adults ate in the dining room, and a little table would be set in the kitchen for the

On Sunday night, they all recall watching Bonanza and, of course, professional wrestling. "Our dad would get us girls in wrestlings holds, and we'd laugh so hard it hurt," said Suzanne.

While Suzanne and Linda were filling the trough each night, Wanda was peeling potatoes and watching the Dick Clark Show. "Daddy had to have fried potatoes every night," said Wanda. "And I got so tired of peeling potatoes.'

Linda recalled a time when Suzanne caused her to get a spanking from her dad. "I was eight, and she was five," said Linda. "I saved bubblegum wrappers and sent away for a little plastic western belt," she said. "It finally arrived in the mail, and I was so proud of it. Suzanne started whining and crying for the belt, but I wouldn't give it to her. Dad made me take it off, and he whipped me with it and then gave it to Suzanne. I never forgave her for that," said Linda. "I bring it up every chance I get."



She supports the organization in many fundraisers and many social and recognition functions to show her continued dedication and support to the American Red Cross in Delaware.

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
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

This is the third in a series of articles exploring family-friendly work policies. This week the emphasis will be on career trajectories. What are the effects of family factors on careers, particularly women's careers, over time? This research was conducted by Heather E. Quick and Phyllis Moen, Ph.D., of Cornell University. The paper was presented in July at the first annual BPW/USA academic symposium, "The Duality of Work and Family Roles"

Quick and Moen list first the conflicts and career consequences of work/family issues. Among these are career interruptions, low mobility, "the second shift" (housework), the "mommy track", and men's careers as

A number of differences are directly related to gender. Men are much more likely than women to remain in the labor force throughout their work lives. Men spend 99.1% of their adult lives working, while women average 82.2%. Women with more family responsibilities have less continuous careers, while those who never marry work an average of 97.68% of their adult lives. Similarly, women with children have more interrupted careers; and those with 3 or more children worked an average of only 77.8% of their adult lives.

On the other hand, research shows that men's lives are affected very little by family contingencies. Whether men are married or remain unmarried has no bearing on career trajectories. Nor does having children affect the continuity of men's worklife.

An interesting sidebar to this research is men's and women's perception of the division of household chores. 7% of men surveyed say, "I do more", to women's 77%. "My spouse does more" report 82% of men and 5% of women surveyed. Furthermore, researchers conclude the greater the responsibility for housework, the less orderly the individual's career.

Time is a resource as is money. Employers can use this information to build a better workforce through sensitivity to family responsibilities and a conscious effort to see workers from a more holistic viewpoint. To do

otherwise, is to miss out on the talent and energy of half the workforce.

The gift of a hermit crab

After the unfortunate accident which consumed my family during the middle of July, our five-year-old son, Clint, was confined to a full sized cast on his right leg. This severely restricted his activity, not a comfortable situation for a child his age.

Attempting to stimulate his environment in other ways, his brothers and sister presented him with a hermit crab.

Hermit crabs are interesting creatures, confined to the limitations of their environment, often a six-inch by twelve-inch plastic container, equipped with sponge for drinking, shell, on which the food is placed, and either small stones or sand to create the impression of its natural environment (if, indeed, hermit crabs care about impressions!). Hermit crabs, by their very nature, must find a new home as they grow. That home is usually a shell into which they back.

Watching this listless animal not do what it doesn't do one afternoon, I pondered the value of this gift. If the world was absent hermit crabs, what would be the consequences?

Upon reflection, I discovered that it is what hermit crabs need,

They need someone to care for them; to be dedicated and committed to their existence. They need their environment clean and stimulating. They need dependability from those under whose charge they find themselves.

First, if Clint, through his experience with this beast, can learn better to care, to be dedicated and committed to something, to someone else, to keep its environment clean and stimulating, and to be dependable in this regard, what a valuable lesson in life he would have learned.

On a more global sense, hermit crabs' needs are a lot like those of people. If we demonstrate these behaviors toward our fellow man, like we would for a hermit crab, wouldn't the world be a better place to live?

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





The upper spine is a flexible column

made up of seven bones called the cervical vertebrae. Each bone (cervical vertebra) is separated by elastic, shockabsorbing discs. Damage to the discs can result in pain and weakness in your neck and arms. A disc may be injured by a sudden movement (herniate) or it may gradually wear out (degeneration). As a result, in either case, a worn out disc may become so flat that the bone above and below begin to touch each other and slip back and forth. As this occurs abnormal bone growth (bone spurs) can form. In all three conditions the pain and weakness in the arm can progress to the point where numbness and tingling can occur as a result of pressure on the nerve traveling from the neck down to the arm. Often times conservative non-operative treatment is

beneficial, however, on occasion cervi-

cal disc surgery is recommended.

CERVICAL DISC SURGERY

Surgery is particularly helpful in a patient with a herniated disc where the disc is placing pressure on the nerve in the neck. The result is pain, weakness, and occasionally numbness and tingling shooting down into the arm. By removing this ruptured disc and fusing the affected disc space, relief of symptoms can be dramatic.

It must be remembered, however, that before a treatment plan for a cervical disc problem can be recommended, a careful evaluation must occur. Often times diagnostic studies including xrays, MRI, CT scans and electromyograms are needed.

On Sunday, August 3, we welcomed back home and to the pulpit Pastor Simpson and his family. Pastor Simpson concluded his messages from I Corinthians two weeks ago and began a study of sermons from Galatians 5:22-26. He spoke to us about the first Fruit of the Spirit, Love.

This text of scripture is speaking to Christians only. Only until we repent of our sins before Christ, and believe in Him and what He has done--then we can experience the fruits of the Spirit. Galatians 5:22 says, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness,

Pastor Simpson reminded us as we study the text of the Fruits of

falling short in certain areas, we should not beat ourselves up with guilt, but take this before the Lord and ask Him to produce in us these characteristics of His Son. Just as God is in control of nature today-the growth of trees, flowers, crops, rainfall--so He is also in control of our growth in Him, if we submit ourselves to Him.

So often as Christians we decide. I need to act a certain way--maybe more loving or more kind--and we try to change ourselves, but until we go before the Lord and ask Him to change us, the changes we try to make ourselves are temporary. Romans 8:4 says, "That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit." When we walk not in the flesh--by our

own strength, but after the Spirit-by submitting ourselves to Christ. When we submit to Christ, our love is not in vain, but brings honor and pleases the Lord.

Pastor Simpson challenged each of us to go before the Lord and pray, "Lord, I want to be more like your Son. Whatever it takes for You to produce these characteristics in me.

As Christians, our lifestyle (the things we do and say each day) reflect who we serve. The scriptures say, "If you love me, keep my commands." (John 14:15) We are commanded to be ambassadors to those around us--our neighbors, friends, family. We are to proclaim the message of Christ and His love. We may have to endure personal rejection from others because of
