Something to cheer about Kristy Litten picked as Blue-Gold cheerleader

Seventeen-year-old Kristy Litten's dreams almost came to an end in November of 1996 while practicing for a cheerleading competition. While attempting a jump, Kristy came down on her leg wrong and underwent surgery to repair her anterior cruciate ligament.

The doctors told her she might never be able to do the physical things she had once lived for such as cheerleading and gymnastics. In fact, he told her she may never walk normally again.

But after ten months of rigorous physical therapy and training, Kristy has been selected to represent the Lake Forest cheerleaders at this year's Blue-Gold Football Game in June.

Her coach, Nikki Ferguson says that she is performing her flips and jumps better than she ever has. "She's probably one of the best flippers on the squad," said Ms. Ferguson.

And flipping's not all she's good at. "She's good at whatever she tries," said Ms. Ferguson. "And to add to that, she's so responsible. Any time I need something done, she's there to help.'

It seems that responsibility

should be Kristy's middle name. A senior at Lake Forest High School, Kristy rises every morning at 5:30 to finish off her homework and then attend school. After school, there's cheerleading practice from 4:30 to 6 p.m. Then it's off to her job at G&B Sub Shop in Felton.

When she finally gets home at night, it's time to crack the books. But she does a little more than crack them. Kristy recently

received the Athletic Scholar All-Conference award for maintaining a 4.0 GPA. She received a varsity letter from the National Honor Society, is a member of the Student Government Association, Business Professionals of America, French Club, Drama Club, Varsity Club, a representative-at-large for the senior class and a member of the P.I.T.C.H. Club.

Kristy has been a cheerleader since she was in the second grade and has taken gymnastics since kindergarten. She has won several gymnastic competitions and trains at Gymnastics Unlimited in Dover. Her room is filled with trophies from both cheerleading and gym-

She is an honor roll student, with her grades this year never dropping below a 97. Mom, Marge Litten, says she doesn't know where Kristy gets it from. "I don't know what drives her, but she never stops," said her mother

Her dad, Greg, is very proud of her also. "He tries to help me as much as he can," said Kristy. "But sometimes, I think he wishes I would just slow down.

You might say that Kristy is not an ordinary teen-ager. Besides her energetic spirit, she has to deal with hypoglycemia every day of her life. She must eat six small meals a day and have a snack several times a day to keep her blood sugar level where it should be. She also has to take iron pills for anemia.

But that doesn't stop her says her mother. She's practicing right now for the Boscov's cheerleading competition, the Blue-Gold football game and also plans to attend a competition in Tampa, Fla. in March where her boyfriend, Stephen Garton, plans to compete right beside her on the same team. "He's also an over-achiever," said

She recalls riding the school bus every day until she graduated from


Seaford with a family of her own, and Dr. Owens said she was like a mother hen to the students on the

Mrs. Jester, 40, a member of the Houston Fire Department and its auxiliary, has headed the annual fire prevention day in Houston since 1981. This special day involves working with approximately 100 agencies. Mrs. Jester


works closely with these agencies as well as day care centers to provide fire safety for children.

She has brought the TOT finder sticker program to the Houston community and serves as a resource person for many fire com-

panies.
"I love helping people," said
Mrs. Jester. "And I especially love helping children. I want them to know that there's someone there for them," she said. Mrs. Jester has been a member

of the fire company since 1982 and is constantly striving to educate the community on fire prevention.

She said that even though her daughter is only 4 years old, she is already quite aware of what fire

prevention is. "She can tell you everything about the fire company and fire prevention," said her mother. "She knows about 911, she knows the escape plan in case of a fire, and she's even been with me when I've taken CPR courses.'

Mrs. Jester said that the first stop when bringing their newborn daughter home from the hospital was at Houston's fire house. "I guess she has a right to know a lot about the fire company," smiled Mrs. Jester.

Devoting a lot of her time to working with the Houston Fire Company in fire prevention, Mrs.

Jester also helps with the relief program when families are burned out. She also plans to initiate a new

program within the Houston Fire Company. She said that the new program would call for children's names to be posted on the dashboard of the family vehicle so that if they are ever in an automobile accident, emergency personnel can call them by their names.

"Children are much calmer if they are called by their names," said Mrs. Jester. "Can you imagine how devastating it is for children in





program, about \$26 million of the \$40 million pledged to the program under the 21st Century Fund has already been budgeted. At best, the remaining money will only carry the program through fiscal year 2000. I think this valuable program needs to be continued.

While I'm on the subject of farming, let me take a minute to explain that while I'm concerned about the environment and the threat posed by pfiesteria I want to guard against any over-reaction triggered by the toxic outbreaks of the microorganism in Maryland last

Some scientist have said the

runoff from fields fertilized with chicken manure is a leading cause of water pollution which in turn leads to making pfiesteria harmful. I'm not convinced.

Pfiesteria is still largely a mystery and I'm concerned that the recurring television images of fish kills on the Pocomoke may lead some people to suggest rash action. As chair of the House Natural Resources Committee, and a member of the House Agriculture Committee, I will have to see clear and compelling evidence that agricultural practices are a major factor in causing this situation before I go along with any regulations that impact Delaware farmers.

It is in that same vain that I will be opposing Gov. Carper's call to make driving without a seat belt a primary offense. Currently, police



and worked there for the next 30 years," said Dr. Owens.

She said growing up on a farm and raising chickens kept the family busy with daily chores. It also kept them from getting into town very often. "We lived so far out, that it was really a hassle to get back into town for extracurricular

activities," said Dr. Owens. She recalls living next door to Anna Mae Baker Draper who graduated from Harrington in 1961. "Her dad had dairy cows, and we'd go every couple of days and get our clean jars filled with fresh milk," she said. "I've often thought about the fact that it was unpasturized," smiled Dr. Owens. "It's a wonder we didn't die from drinking it."

She recalls teachers at school like Mr. Melvin Brobst, Miss Dickrager, Mr. Messner and Mr Feagan. She was in Mrs. Ruth Grant's first-grade class down in the basement of the old school. "Mr. Grant cleaned erasers down there next to the cafeteria, and there was asbestos everywhere," she recalled.

After graduating valedictorian of her class, Dr. Owens began classes at the University of Delaware. Since she had already begun college classes while a senior, she graduated in 3 1/2 years.

While a junior in college, Pan Am Airlines recruited her to become an airline stewardess. She flew for Pan Am the summer before her junior and senior years in college and then after graduating, she flew from January until the fall.

She lived in New York for three months and in San Francisco for 10 months. This was during the Vietnam Conflict, and Dr. Owens recalls flying R&R with the troops every six months to Hawaii.

While Dr. Owens was in college, she worked at the Milford Memorial Hospital lab and she also worked for Dr. Vincent Lobo in Harrington one summer.

"I guess I got really comfortable working in medicine, and I really felt like it was something I could do," said Dr. Owens.

She had already been accepted at the Medical College of Virginia in Richmond. It was there she met her husband, Dr. Louis Owens, now a radiologist. They were wed in 1969.

She got her MD from the college. in Virginia and eventually she and her husband joined the Air Force. She went to California and did her pediatric training at the Travis Air Force Base Hospital and also did some training at the University of California. She graduated from medical school in 1974.

Her first job after training was at Dover Air Force Base, but they sent her husband to Thailand. He eventually joined her at Dover.


