Trailer residents stand their ground

Participants in a closed meeting regarding the fate of 14 tenants slated for ouster from a trailer park on the state fairgrounds report progress. Another meeting is scheduled for March 16.

The tenants, who have lived in the park since the 1970s, are mostly senior citizens who were involved in harness racing at Harrington Raceway. Most say they have no money or alternative sites for their aging trailers.

Delaware State Fair officials want the trailer park cleared to make way for a road and horse training barns. An eviction hearing has been set for March 30.

The tenants were told they had to leave by March 1 more than one year ago, said Delaware Delaware State Fair general manager Dennis

Christopher White, a Legal Aid attorney representing the tenants, said he was encouraged by an outpouring of offers of assistance.

"There's not a lot to report, but 'making progress' is a good way to put it," he said.

Agencies participating in the meeting were the Delaware State Housing Authority, the state Division of Aging, Harrington Senior Center, First State Manufactured Housing Institute and the Kent County Department of Human Services.

"About all I can tell you is that we're just trying to help," said Cathy Gregory, assistant director of the housing authority.

Councilwoman Priscilla B. Coryell who gives her age as "over 65" replaced Councilman Linwood Kates who resigned his Ward 5 council seat last year.

Mrs. Coryell has lived in Harrington for 12 years with her husband, Leonard Corvell, Harrington's City Manager. When asked what her husband thought about her applying for the council seat, Mrs. Coryell replied, "He really wasn't concerned," she said. "He told me it was up to me. That's the kind of relationship we have.'

The Coryells have been married for 24 years. They moved here from Texas to retire. Their reason for picking Harrington was the fact that they have friends and relatives here. "Also, it is centrally located, and we both love the seashore, said Mrs. Coryell.

Citing the fact that no one else

seemed interested in filling the empty council seat last November, Mrs. Coryell thought it should be filled, so she filed for it.

Her main goal as a councilwoman is to balance the budget within the tax structure so that taxes will not have to be raised. "I'm a taxpayer too," she said. "And I certainly don't want to pay anymore taxes.

She said she would love to see a park in Harrington but not at the expense of the taxpavers. She also said that she was never against the youth center. "I was just concerned about where the money was going to come from," she said, adding that she feels her husband has solved the problem and that the youth center is up and running.





Harrington Raceway needs work

Yes, this is in response to a recent article about the Harrington Raceway and wanting more money from the slots. I would just like to ask Harrington Raceway officials what they're doing with all of the slots revenues that they're getting anyway and all of the other money they're taking from the horseman? The stall rent has more than doubled in the last year and a half since they brought the slots. There had to be horses evacuated out of the barns recently because they were standing in two feet of water. They won't do anything to repair the barns. They just keep putting the stall rent higher and higher. Now they're charging you \$50 for tack rooms in order to store your equipment and lock it up so it doesn't get stolen. Effective April 1 last year, you were no longer allowed to keep dogs on the race track. That used to help from getting your stuff stolen. I understand that they want to put out a very expensive totalization board that they want horsemen to pay for, but it has to be big enough to have as a stage for the Delaware State Fair for the week of the fair. So why can't the Delaware State Fair pay for the tote board so that they can ue it for the stage? Harrington is just ripping off the horsemen and the state taxpayers every chance they get.

I have seen teenagers come in and pass the food stamps out to each other and then I was threatened when I asked to see a food stamp ID, which anyone using food stamps is supposed to have anyhow. I know of someone, in my own family getting food stamps and selling them for half the face value to another family member. When it was reported to the state, they made no effort to check into it. I really can see why we are so angry with the food stamp system.

The first game of the single elimination tournament will feature a band of rough and ready riders consisting of Harrington and Felton firefighters and the select group of equestrians, Frederica and Bowers Beach firefighters. After this classic battle has been waged, the Lake Forest High School staff and faculty will collide with the varsity team members.

The winners of the two hardwood wars (or is it roars?) will go after the less-than-coveted title in the championship game. Yet, many fans believe it is the donkeys who are the very pride of the court and the stars of the show.

The talented and sportsminded animals are from the Buckeye Donkey Ball Co. of Columbus, Ohio, and all of them know their way around a basketball court.

Donkey basketball is played with four donkeys and four riders on each team. One of the donkey teams is comprised of Beatle Bomb, Super Stupid, Elvis and Rigor Mortis. The other team is formed by Thunder Ball, Snuffy, Kilroy and Honey Pot, the world's buckin'est donkey.

Rules are necessary to all sports, but since the donkeys can't read, and the players will be too excited to remember them, we will list them for the benefit of the fans and hope someone on the basketball court will know what is happening.

Donkey Ball Rules1. Players lead their own donkey onto the court and line up under the opposition's basket.

2. Players must stay dismounted until they and the donkeys are introduced and the referee blows the whistle and throws out the ball to start the game. Players may then ride or lead their donkey to the ball. (Whichever works best.)

3. When passing the ball be-tween players, one or the other must be mounted.

4. Players must be mounted to shoot, steal ball or block passes and

5. Ball cannot be held more than 15 seconds.

6. There are no fouls, out-ofbounds, or time-outs except for emergencies. Rules infractions may invoke a "loss of ball" penalty.

7. Players must not pull hair, ears or tails of donkeys or each other. Use caution when catching adonkey and please stay off his rear end at all times.

8. Players can substitute for a teammate or trade donkeys with him at any time. No one can keep! the same donkey for more than one

9. Please do not push or pull anyone from their donkey.

10. Teams must trade sets of donkeys and baskets at the half. Please dismount at the sound of the horn and await instructions from

11. Players are advised to wear football helmets and any other available padding that isn't already

12. Unless a sanitation crew is. arranged, each player is responsible for his own donkey. A broom and shovel will be handy at all time.

Ophthalmic research has demonstrated that the first three years of life are critical in the develop-

The Harrington Lions Club is playing a vital role in saving the sight of children by hosting a free vision screening event at the Harrington Senior Center on Saturday, March 14, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

With the use of a specialized camera, the MTI PhotoScreener^{1 m} testing children's eyes, as well as senior citizens and anyone else interested in the eye test, is easy, fast and effective. It's also non-invasive, ensuring the child of a nonthreatening environment in which to be screened.

The testing method includes a portable photoscreening camera which uses instant film that can screen for six major eye disorders including near and far sightedness, astigmatism, anisometropia (unequal refraction), medial opacities (i.e. cataracts), and strabimus (misalighed eyes).

Potential eye disorders show up as crescents on the photograph, and if a problem is detected, the child can be referred to an eyecare professional for a full ophthalmological exam. It is recommended that a child's vision be regularly checked due to their continued develop-



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

This will actually be Myers' second trip to the NCAAs, the Bowers


Beach native was Delaware's team manager when the Hens played in Indianapolis in 1993.
