The Harrington Police Department recently launched one of the first police-administered automated external defibrillator (AED) program in the state by adopting FirstSave AEDs from SurViva-Link, the Minneapolis-based manufacturer.

Officers in the Harrington community will carry FirstSave Systems in their patrol cars and are being trained to use them to assist cardiac arrest victims. Patrolman Mark Anderson, a 2 1/2-year veteran of the Harrington Police Department, feels that the machines are great. "We will work very closely with the paramedics to help save even more lives," he said. FirstSave is a portable device

that delivers an electric shock to the



Glenna Smith, a long-time Harrington resident and senior citizen, donated the funds to purchase an AED for her community. "We are extremely grateful to Ms. Smith for her generosity and interest in the community," said Chief Frank G. Melvin Jr. of the Harrington Police Department. "Most of our citizens are senior citizens and our officers have encountered cardiac emergencies.

"We can reach any citizen within 2-3 minutes, and we're often first on the scene. With an AED, we can increase the chances of surviving sudden cardiac arrest in Harrington," said Chief Melvin.

Because of the need to administer life-saving defibrillation quickly, time is the biggest enemy of a

Harrington Post Office mural dates back to 1939

In 1934, the government's Section of Painting and Sculpture (later the Section of Fine Arts) was established under the Treasury Department to create murals and sculptures for federal buildings and post offices throughout the country.

with "a more abundant life" meant more than material wealth, and promoted an improved intellectual life and appreciation of the arts.

He felt that federal art projects could uplift people's lives by giving them new hope and providing beauty in their dismal surroundings.

Artists traveled throughout the United States to witness everyday

Eleven of the 12 defendants -who were represented by Christopher White, an attorney for Community Legal Aide -- were told their eviction notices were handled correctly and the fair had the right to close the trailer park to make way for improvements.

One tenant, Terri Johnson, was given some relief when Judge Ernst M. Arndt, dismissed the suit against her.

In his ruling, Judge Arndt said since there was no supporting documentation to show she had been given an eviction notice and the fair had accepted her rent check in March.

Nicholas H. Rodriguez, who represented the Delaware State Fair, said the dismissal would be appealed. A date for the tenants to vacate has not been established, Mr. Rodriguez said. It cannot be established until the appeals process is complete. Mr. Rodriguez predicted this could take another 1 1/2 months.

Tenants were told in February 1997 the trailer park would be closed March 1, 1998, to make way for improvements to the barns and stalls and to expand stables and training areas for harness horses to the west end of the property.

In all, 19 tenants lived in the park, many in mobile homes they

bought years ago. Because of their age -- and because many mobile home parks would not accept them -- some of the tenants felt they were not able to move. Seven families moved out, leaving the 12 who were sued. Those 12 failed to vacate, so the

fair proceeded with legal action to force them out.

It was during the Great Depression, and Americans in cities, small towns and rural areas responded to the crisis by working hard to survive and by re-examining the image of their country and its people.

As the country pulled together for recovery, a strong sense of nationalism inspired political leaders and artists to attempt to document life in the United States.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt believed that providing citizens life, striving to capture the history of communities and create an artistic legacy of the world around them.

In Delaware, this legacy of murals and paintings reveal a great deal about the experiences of rural residents during the 1930s.

Section artists competed for commissions to complete murals in public buildings, and the Harrington Post Office contract was awarded to Eve Salisbury of Long Island, New York on July 1, 1939. The mural measures 14 feet wide


were placed in public buildings where ordinary citizens could view them daily

In Delaware, artists painted murals in seven post offices throughout the state on subjects ranging from harvesting fields to the state's history of the new and expanding broiler industry.

When Daffodils are Out Dear God, I had forgotten how


good a day could be, For winter winds had blotted out from my poor memory,

"We're disappointed," Mr. White said. He will appeal the verdict to a three-judge appeal panel. That appeal must be filed within five business days.

Mr. White said he believed he had at least one strong argument on which to appeal the case beyond the Magistrate Appeal panel to the Superior Court, but would not elaborate.

"Land-use reasons to close a mobile home park are wrong," Mr. White said. "They leave the tenants at the mercy of the people who own the parks.

Mr. White said his clients have no disposable income to speak of and because of the age of their homes, many would be hard pressed to pay th increase in lot rent, and a mortgage payment for a new home.

Fair General Manager Dennis Hazzard said the entire series of events has not been pleasant.

"Obviously there is concern for these people," he said. "We feel vindicated in that the jury agreed it is our right to do what we need to do with our property to improve it."

Mr. Hazzard said the fair has continued to provide water, electric and sewer service to the park and would continue to do so while the appeals take place.

"I can't believe it," said Maria Schmidt, a widow who lives in the park. "It puts us in with the horses and the pigs, and they can do what they want," she said. "It is just the money that counts.

The issue of closing the trailer park came after the Delaware State Fair Board of Directors decided more than a year ago to use the proceeds from their highly successful slot machine operations to improve the fairgrounds and training facili-

The small trailer park, which has been in operation since the early 1960s, will be removed, and the rundown barns which are adjacent to them will be torn down to make room for new and improved facilities, according to long range plans presented in testimony before the court.

Greenwood police officer put on leave

An officer in the Greenwood Police Department has been placed on administrative leave while the department is being investigated by the Attorney General's Office, Mayor Randy Willey said last Wednesday morning.

"We have an officer who is on administrative leave right now,' said Mayor Willey. "As of right now, there isn't much else we can say.

The Attorney General's Office is investigating an incident involving the police department that occurred about a month ago, but neither town officials nor the Attorney General's Office will disclose the nature of the investigation.

It's an ongoing criminal investigation," said Eugene M. Hall, director of the fraud division of the Attorney General's Office. "It's not conducive to the investigation to discuss it at this point. It would not be fair to any of the parties involved," Mr. Hall added.

"We're hoping it will be resolved in about a week. We can't say too much until then," said Mayor Willey. "The Attorney General's Office has asked that all that information come from them.... However, when the investigation is concluded, we'll talk about it. Everyone's already talking about it. We'd like to see that someone speaks the truth."

Greenwood Police Chief Robbin E. Vann confirmed that the Attorney General's Office is conducting an investigation, but declined further comment, saying that he will release a prepared statement at some point in the future.

"We don't want to take anything away from the paramedics," said Patrolman Anderson. "They do a great job and are normally on the scene within minutes," he said. "But as police officers, we are sometimes on the scene before the paramedics. If we have an opportunity to save a life, that's what we're. here for."
