


## St Stephens Restoration


### THANK YOU, CRYSTAL TRUST!


Beginning in May, the former St. Stephens Episcopal Church, which today serves as one of our three museums locations, will undergo a major restoration project. The restorations and repairs will include WOOD repairs to the exterior of the building and repainting of the entire structure. Installing the cross back on top of the steeple. Necessary repairs to the bell cradle so the bell can ring again! And the most exciting thing of all, the windows will have stained glass reinstalled! Again, a huge thank you to Crystal Trust for the generous grant! A special rededication of the church will occur during Harrington Heritage Day, set for August 24, 2024.
